

Never give in then, my dear brothers, never admit defeat; keep on working at the Lord's work always, knowing that, in the Lord, you cannot be labouring in vain.

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke

A person speaks from what is in his heart.

Jesus told a parable to his disciples, 'Can one blind man guide another? Surely both will fall into a pit? The disciple is not superior to his teacher; the fully trained disciple will always be like his teacher. Why do you observe the splinter in your brother's eye and never notice the plank in your own? How can you say to your brother, "Brother, let me take out the splinter that is in your eye," when you cannot see the plank in your own? Hypocrite! Take the plank out of your own eye first, and then you will see clearly enough to take out the splinter that is in your brother's eye. There is no sound tree that produces rotten fruit, nor again a rotten tree that produces sound fruit. For every tree can be told by its own fruit: people do not pick figs from thorns, nor gather grapes from brambles. A good man draws what is good from the store of goodness in his heart; a bad man draws what is bad from the store of badness. For a man's words flow out of what fills his heart.

Announcement about Cardinal George Pell

You would have heard the news that a jury has found Cardinal Pell guilty of assaulting two choirboys in Melbourne Cathedral in 1996. Just three points:

- 1. Sexual abuse is a grave sin contradictory to everything the Catholic Church exists for. If you know of it happening please report it immediately to the police;
- 2. The Cardinal strenuously denies this happened, and has started an appeal which may not be heard for many months. Appeals can overturn convictions, as happened last year with Archbishop Wilson; therefore, waiting to see what the appeal judges have to say would be wise; and
- 3. We enclose an article sent to us by Archbishop Fisher, OP written by Fr Frank Brennan, SJ. Additionally, Fr Josh, Fr Bhaskar, and I are available to talk if you wish.

Bookkeeping for the Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion

If you take Holy Communion to anyone who is housebound, please write down the name of the person to whom you are bringing the Blessed Sacrament to receive Holy Communion in the book in the Sacristy. The records in this book will enable me to be aware of the pastoral needs of the parishioners in their homes.

Commitment Mass—Reconciliation Sacramental Program

At all the Masses this Sunday, the children who are being prepared for their First Reconciliation will be making their commitment to participate in the Sacramental Program. As they make their commitment, this will be a good opportunity for us to support them in your prayer so that they can be well prepared to encounter Jesus in this special sacrament of his mercy.

Fasting and Abstinence on Ash Wednesday

Ash Wednesday, like Good Friday, is an obligatory day of fasting and abstinence for Catholic adults. This means:

- (1) eating small simple meals (such as bread and water) throughout the day that do not add up to the size of a regular meal;
- (2) one regular meal; and
- (3) all these meals do not include meat.

All who have completed their 18th year but have not yet begun their 16th year are bound to fast. All who have completed their 14th year are bound to abstain. I invite you to read the additional information about penitential practices during Lent which has been put on the Parish Notice Board. This information consists of the Archbishop of Sydney's pastoral letter entitled, *Lenten Penance*.

Change of Mass Time on Weekdays

Last Sunday, a message was published in the Parish Bulletin requesting your feedback regarding whether or not you think the weekday Mass time should be changed from 9:00 to 9:15 am. This question was asked because the Parish's car park becomes congested while students walk through it to go to the Primary School as the 9:00 am Mass approaches on weekdays. Consequently, a number of children have almost been run over. You may recall that a number of messages were published in the Parish Bulletin about this danger last year, yet children have still almost been run over by cars in the car park. Given that all the feedback received is in favour of changing the weekday Mass time, Masses on Monday to Friday will start at 9:15 am, but this change will not commence until Ash Wednesday (6 March).

In other words, all Masses prior to Ash Wednesday will still start at 9:00 am. This change of Mass time will also enable the parents who attend the School Assembly to come to Mass on weekdays before Mass begins.

REFLECTION by Dianne Bergant CSA

Lent opens with readings that call us to penance. However, this penance must be understood within its proper context. Penance is really an attempt to correct what is upset, to repair what is broken, to atone for the wrong done. Penance must spring from a contrite heart or acts of penance can be merely external feats of endurance.

Nothing that we do can reconcile us with God. No penance, regardless of its severity, can repair a ruptured covenant bond. Only the mercy and graciousness of God can accomplish this. And God has accomplished it in the death and resurrection of Jesus. It was God's love for sinners that prompted such a magnanimous display of divine love. Through Jesus, the entire world has been reconciled to God. Now, each individual has the opportunity to be reconciled. Penance and acts of devotion are ways of benefiting from the treasury of divine mercy and love. They do not buy reconciliation; it has already been purchased.

Almsgiving and fasting and prayer are honoured ways of changing whatever prevents us from drinking from the streams of divine grace. Almsgiving reminds us of the covenant bond that joins us with each other and of the social responsibilities that accompany it. Fasting sensitises us to the dependence we have on the natural world. It also curbs our insatiable desire for more and more. Prayer unites us with God, the source of our being and our merciful covenant partner.
