# Sixth Sunday of Easter - Year A (17 May, 2020)

# Entrance Antiphon Cf. Is 48:20

Proclaim a joyful sound and let it be heard; proclaim to the ends of the earth: The Lord has freed his people, alleluia.

#### First Reading Acts 8:5-8. 14-17 A reading from the Acts of the Apostles

Philip went to a Samaritan town and proclaimed the Christ to them. The people united in welcoming the message Philip preached, either because they had heard of the miracles he worked or because they saw them for themselves. There were, for example, unclean spirits that came shrieking out of many who were possessed, and several paralytics and cripples were cured. As a result there was great rejoicing in that town. When the apostles in Jerusalem heard that Samaria had accepted the word of God, they sent Peter and John to them, and they went down there, and prayed for the Samaritans to receive the Holy Spirit, for as yet he had not come down on any of them: they had only been baptised in the name of the Lord Jesus. Then they laid hands on them, and they received the Holy Spirit.

# Second Reading 1 Pt 3:15-18

### A reading from the first letter of St Peter

But give it with courtesy and respect and with a clear conscience, so that those who slander you when you are living a good life in Christ may be proved wrong in the accusations that they bring. And if it is the will of God that you should suffer, it is better to suffer for doing right than for doing wrong. Why, Christ himself, innocent though he was, had died once for sins, died for the guilty, to lead us to God. In the body he was put to death, in the spirit he was raised to life.

Anybody who receives my commandments and keeps them will be one who loves me; and anybody who loves me will be loved by my Father, and I shall love him and show myself to him.'

# Message from the Parish Priest

# The Sacrament of Reconciliation

Since the Government has mandated that places of worship be closed during the current pandemic restrictions, the Archbishop encouraged us in his pastoral letter in March to make an act of contrition during our self-isolation. Consequently, a number of people have been asking questions about the Sacrament of Reconciliation, such as, "If I tell God that I am sorry for my sins, do I need to go to Confession after the pandemic restrictions cease?" To answer this question, we must first begin by affirming that God is not restricted to the sacraments for the forgiveness of sins. Principally, we can receive God's pardon and peace through a perfect act of contrition. Basically, such contrition is in response to the love of God, not fear of punishment.

That being said, regarding people who are conscious of serious sin, the Archbishop has instructed the faithful that such penitents would still need to confess their sins in the Sacrament of Reconciliation as soon as it becomes available. Ultimately, penitents who are conscious of serious sin could not be assured that they have received God's pardon and peace if they attempt to make a perfect act of contrition, for how can they be assured that they are sufficiently motivated by the love of God in expressing their sorrow? Such assurance may amount to being presumptuous of God's mercy, unless they are only conscious of venial sins, for unlike serious sins, venial sins do not need to be confessed.

Having stated this, the devotional use of the Sacrament of Reconciliation (that is, the confession of venial sins) is a commendable practice. For although venial sins can be forgiven without the sacramental confession, the Catholic Church recommends we confess them.


#### **Message from the Parish Priest (Continued)**

While venial sins do not extinguish sanctifying grace, they still incur temporal punishment and stunt our spiritual growth (see Catechism of the Catholic Church, no. 1863). Pope St John Paul II told the priests who were hearing confessions in the basilicas of Rome on 13 March 1999, "It should not be forgotten that the so-called confession of devotion was the school which formed the great saints." Likewise, Our Lord said to St Veronica Juliani: "You shall make progress in perfect in proportion to the fruits which you shall draw from this sacrament."

Another question people have been asking is, "Why do sins need to be confessed?" The confession of sins are integral to the Sacrament of Reconciliation because when Jesus entrusted this sacrament to his apostles, he said: "As the Father has sent me, even so I send you." And when he said this, he breathed on them, and said to them, "Receive the Holy Spirit. If you forgive the sins of any, they are forgiven; if you retain the sins of any, they are retained" (Jn 20:21-23). In these words, Jesus' instruction for sins to be confessed are clearly manifest. Ultimately, how would the priests of the Church know which sins to forgive (by giving absolution) and which sins to retain (by not giving absolution) if they did not hear them?


Indeed, Jesus forgives sins through the ministry of the priest; still, the priest cannot do anything that Christ himself cannot do, namely, absolve the sins of a penitent who is not sorry, either through having no contrition, or not having a firm purpose of amendment by not willing to avoid any future occasions of sin.

We may need to wait for some time yet before the celebration of Mass can be made available for the entire public. But, you can be assured that now that the Government has allowed places of worship to be open sufficiently enough for the private prayer of small groups of people, Fr Josh, Fr William, and I will be making ourselves available for the Sacrament of Reconciliation at times which will be published on the Parish's website and Facebook page.
