Mt 25:1-13

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew

Jesus told this parable to his disciples: 'The kingdom of heaven will be like this: Ten bridesmaids took their lamps and went to meet the bridegroom. Five of them were foolish and five of them were sensible: the foolish ones did take their lamps, but they brought no oil, whereas the sensible ones took flasks of oil as well as their lamps. The bridegroom was late, and they all grew drowsy and fell asleep. But at midnight there was a cry, "The bridegroom is here! Go out and meet him." At this, all those bridesmaids woke up and trimmed their lamps, and the foolish ones said to the sensible ones, "Give us some of your oil: our lamps are going out." But they replied, "There may not be enough for us and for you; you had better go to those who sell it and buy some for yourselves." They had gone off to buy it when the bridegroom arrived. Those who were ready went in with him to the wedding hall and the door was closed. The other bridesmaids arrived later. "Lord, Lord," they said, "open the door for us." But he replied, "I tell you solemnly, I do not know you." So stay awake, because you do not know either the day or the hour.'

Message from Fr. Bob Bossini

Dear Friends,

In the final three Sundays of the Church's liturgical year, the Gospel is taken from Chapter 25 of Matthew's Gospel. This chapter comes from the final sermon in Matthew (Chapters 23-25), with the basic theme of Jesus' criticism of the religious leaders, the final coming of the Kingdom of God and the characteristics we need to possess in order to be part of this Kingdom. These chapters parallel and mirror Matthew 5-7, the Sermon on the Mount, which outline and emphasise the new teaching of Jesus, based on the Mosaic Taking its lead from Matthew ('Immediately after the distress of those days, the sun will be darkened, the moon will not give its light and the stars will fall from the sky and the powers of heaven will be shaken'], which introduces and continues the theme of watchfulness until the coming of the Kingdom of God at the end of time, Chapter 25 gives us three parables on the virtues every believer needs to have while awaiting this Kingdom. Matthew 25 is divided as follows:

 $\underline{32^{nd}}$ Sunday (Nov $\underline{12^{th}}$) ~ The Parable of the Wise and Foolish Bridesmaids (25:1-13)

 $\underline{33^{rd} \ Sunday \ (Nov \ 19^{th})}$ ~ The Parable of the Talents (25:14-30)

34th Sunday (Nov 26th – Christ the King) ~ Parable of the Last Judgement (25:31-46)

These readings have the overall theme of the **unexpected** and **sudden** appearance of Jesus.

The Parable of the Wise and Foolish Bridesmaids, which makes up today's Gospel has three characters: The Bridegroom, the virtuous maids and the foolish maids. The image of the Bridegroom is one, that in the Old Testament has been ascribed to God [See Isaiah 54:5; Jeremiah 31:32 and Hosea 2:16]. In the New Testament, it is an image given to Jesus [Matthew 9:15]. The issue here is the delay of the Bridegroom in arriving for the marriage ceremony. The awaiting maids fall asleep in the meantime. The difference between the wise and foolish maids, is that the wise maidens have brought extra oil for their lamps and so are prepared to go and welcome the Bridegroom, whose arrival has been finally announced. The central themes of the Parable are: the ability of the individual to be prepared and the unexpected arrival of the bridegroom.

We need to realise the importance and centrality of the oil in this parable. The oil is central to the working of the lamp. Its absence has the same result as a torch without batteries. It symbolises in this parable the elements necessary for the encounter of the individual with the Bridegroom.

It would be foolish, if not fatal to venture into the dark with lamps without sufficient oil, no matter how important it is to meet the Bridegroom. The supply of this oil is the one thing that differentiates the two group of women. It becomes a reminder that we cannot be in a position to 'borrow' from another person's good works. We cannot utilise the spiritual gifts of others for our own benefit. We need to ensure that we have enough 'oil' in order to keep alive our spiritual lives, and so not to be caught wanting when to hour comes.

Ultimately, the parable urges us to be continually ready and prepared for the delayed and surprising arrival of the Bridegroom. Our lives need to be lived in such a way that we should not be found wanting when the Bridegroom arrives. We do not know the time, day or the hour of His Second Coming. We only live in hope and expectation of it. This month of November – the Month of the Holy Souls – challenges us to ensure that we have sufficient 'oil' for our spiritual lamps.

We should therefore be able to ensure that we are living lives that allow us to be prepared for Jesus' unexpected and sudden coming. As the wise bridesmaids brought extra oil while they awaited the coming of the bridegroom, we can ask ourselves: what is it that we need to have in order to be prepared for Jesus' coming? The First Reading today reminds us that **Wisdom** becomes an important factor in all this. For us to acquire or to live with this type of wisdom means being prepared for God's reign. Readiness that comes from Wisdom, is then an attitude, a commitment and a lifestyle. It means living in ways that conform to the character of God's Kingdom by our being faithful to its values and demands. This is the essential 'oil' that we require.


Each expectant mother and her unborn child will receive an individual blessing from Bishop Umbers, as well as a small gift from the Life, Marriage & Family Team.
