No, you are all sons of light and sons of the day: we do not belong to the night or to darkness, so we should not go on sleeping, as everyone else does, but stay wide awake and sober.

Mt 25:14-30

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew

Jesus spoke this parable to his disciples: 'The kingdom of heaven is like a man on his way abroad who summoned his servants and entrusted his property to them. To one he gave five talents, to another two, to a third one; each in proportion to his ability. Then he set out. The man who had received the five talents promptly went and traded with them and made five more.

The man who had received two made two more in the same way. But the man who had received one went off and dug a hole in the ground and hid his master's money. Now a long time after, the master of those servants came back and went through his accounts with them. The man who had received the five talents came forward bringing five more. "Sir", he said "you entrusted me with five talents; here are five more that I have made." His master said to him, "Well done, good and faithful servant; you have shown you can be faithful in small things, I will trust you with greater; come and join in your master's happiness." Next the man with the two talents came forward. "Sir," he said "you entrusted me with two talents; here are two more that I have made." His master said to him, "Well done, good and faithful servant; you have shown you can be faithful in small things, I will trust you with greater; come and join in your master's happiness." Last came forward the man who had the one talent. "Sir," said he "I had heard you were a hard man, reaping where you have not sown and gathering where you have not scattered; so I was afraid, and I went off and hid your talent in the ground. Here it is; it was yours, you have it back." But his master answered him, "You wicked and lazy servant! So you knew that I reap where I have not sown and gather where I have not scattered? Well then, you should have deposited my money with the bankers, and on my return I would have recovered my capital with interest. So now, take the talent from him and give it to the man who has the five talents. For to everyone who has will be given more, and he will have more than enough; but from the man who has not, even what he has will be taken away. As for this good-for-nothing servant, throw him out into the dark, where there will be weeping and grinding of teeth.""

Message from Fr. Bob Bossini

Dear Friends,

In today's Gospel [Matthew 25:14-30] we have the second of three parables that allows us to come to an understanding of the traits necessary to be a Christian disciple. This parable centres around our being aware of the fact that God has given us all talents, according to our own abilities. In giving us these gifts, God then expects us to be able to utilise them to the best of our ability and in so doing allow the Kingdom of God to grow.

In our second reading [1 Thessalonians 5:1-6], Paul asks his readers to be vigilant, telling them to live as if they were people of the day and not like those who live in the night – asleep. The central element here is that a certain amount of activity and daring is asked of the disciple. As people living in the daylight, we have to be industrious with regard to our dealings with the Kingdom. The day is not meant for rest. It is a time allotted for work, industry and risk taking. Something positive then is expected of the disciple, since in being involved in the things of the day, one becomes more vigilant of what is required in this interim period while we await the coming of the Lord.

What then is this vigilance that the Gospel asks of us today? We saw in last week's Gospel [Matthew] 25:1-13 -the parable of the ten bridesmaids] that this vigilance comprises of our having 'enough oil for our lamps' as we await the coming of the Bridegroom. It means that we cannot claim the good works of others as our good works. We cannot borrow the 'oil' of other people as claim it as our own. Each of us is responsible for pour own good works and efforts. It challenges us to recognise the presence of the virtue of **PRUDENCE** (WISDOM) in of lives: are we capable of making the right decisions, of discerning matters through the will and mind of God. In today's parable, the master deals out the talents to his servants according to their abilities: to one he gave five talents, to another two and to a third, one. The master does not tell his servants how to deal with these talents, but there is an underlying expectation that they are to use them appropriately. The reader knows that the master will return and so demand of his servants the interest he expects them to make with the talents allotted to them. We find out that the first two servants doubled their store of talents. The third simply gave the talent back.

Unlike the first two servants on whom the master heaped a great amount praise ['*Well done good and faithful servant...come join in your master's happiness*'], the third servant receives the rebuke of the master for his idleness and lack of risk taking. This parable challenges us to recognise that true Christian servitude and stewardship consists in not only recognising our God given gifts, but also to be able to take the risk to develop and utilise them for the greater glory of God and His Kingdom. It challenges us to recognise the presence of another great virtue in our Christian lives, that of **FORTITUDE** or the strength of character to be able to realise the good decisions we have made. It is a useless exercise for us to simply encounter the Lord and return our gifts untouched, undeveloped and unused. God expects better from us. Indeed next week's Gospel [Matthew 25:31 -46] challenges us to realise that we bring about judgement on ourselves through our involvement or non-involvement in tending to the needs of others.

The growth and development of our Parish community demands that each of us examine their own lives (through the use of the virtue of **PRU-DENCE**), recognise and name their gifts and be prepared to utilise them for the benefit of the community 9 by having the **FORTITUDE** or strength) to bring our decisions to fruition. In doing so we enter into the true meaning of Christian service and stewardship. What are my gifts and am I prepared to take the necessary risks to develop and utilise them for the growth of God's Kingdom?
