

Message from Fr. Bob Bossini

Dear Friends,

Today, being the First Sunday of **Advent**, we begin a new Liturgical year. We are entering **Year 'B' – the Year of Mark.** Although this season may seem like a mini-Lent, the season of Advent focuses more on waiting than it does on things penitential, even though the liturgical colour is purple or violet.

The First Sunday of Advent usually focuses on the theme of the end time - the second coming of Jesus Christ. The Gospel today [Mark 13:33-37], calls us to vigilance: something is coming that we dare not miss. Mark tells us quite dramatically: 'Be on your guard, stay awake, because you never know when the time will come' [v.33]. Mark goes on to give the illustration of a householder who travels overseas and leaves his servants to their various tasks. He stresses that they should do what is expected of them, stay vigilant because they are not aware of when their master will return. This recalls for me my school days when our teacher would give us some work to complete – a maths exercise or an essay for English. He would then leave the classroom to attend to some task. We would continue working diligently on our task, even though we had the temptation to abandon the task and 'do our own thing'. Not knowing when the teacher would return we decided to complete the task so that when he suddenly returned to the classroom he would find us attentive to the task given.

This theme of waiting and vigilance forms the first part of this particular Sunday of Advent. When we consider the First Reading [Isaiah 63:16-17; 64:1.3-8] we encounter our second theme: that of people crying out to the Lord for the many sufferings that they are enduring. This First Sunday of Advent focuses our gaze on a world that is often abounding or at least experiencing pain and suffering, as we have experienced in these last months of pandemic. It allows us to see that the answer to that suffering is fixed on the hope that one places in the Day of the Lord.

Advent is a time that is filled with anticipation and therefore filled with vision and opportunity. It is a time to imagine what is possible in the limitless world of personal interaction with a loving God. Anticipation is a state of mind that can run the spectrum from wonder and hope to despair and fear. Who among us has not anticipated the celebration which comes with some significant accomplishment such as graduation or marriage as well as the fear and concern that accompanies the anticipation of undergoing surgery or the loss of a job? As we begin this Advent season we have the opportunity once again to recall our origins which come from a loving and merciful God and the opportunities that can define our lives in the uniquely personal relationship which is available to us in Jesus Christ.

These encounters are found in our daily lives, in the ordinary events that we find the opportunity to experience the **extraordinary** if we are willing to reach out in faith and in hope-filled anticipation to a loving God who comes to us in so many small and ordinary ways each day.

The overriding theme today is the catch cry: 'Stay Awake!" It calls us to be alert not only in reading the signs of the times, but also in the elements of our faith. We may say of today's Christian generation that there is a certain apathy or complacency when it comes to living out and praying the elements of our faith. We may be entering into a phase where Christian principles and ethics are being not only questioned but also abandoned as possibly being outdated and outmoded. Perhaps our instant gratifying age may have added to this. As we begin our season of Advent and hear the cry 'Stay Awake!", perhaps with regard to our faith, we really need to say 'Wake up!' - recognise the richness, depth and significance of our faith, especially as we prepare to recall that special moment in our story when the divine and human meet in the person of a small Child in the insignificant town of Bethlehem. How will I receive that news this year? How will it stir my faith? How alert and receptive will I be to its meaning in my life and world?

We can echo the words of Paul found in our second reading today: "the witness to Christ has indeed been strong among you so that you will not be without any of the gifts of the Spirit while you are waiting for our Lord Jesus Christ to be revealed; and he will keep you steady and without blame until the last day, the day of our Lord Jesus Christ, because God by calling you has joined you to his Son, Jesus Christ; and God is faithful" [1 Corinthians 1:6-9]


