# The Second Sunday of Advent - Year B (06 December, 2020)

**Entrance Antiphon** *Cf. Is 30:19,30* 

O people of Sion, behold, the Lord will come to save the nations, and the Lord will make the glory of his voice heard in the joy of your heart.

**First Reading** Is 40:1-5. 9-11

A reading from the prophet Isaiah

'Console my people, console them' says your God. 'Speak to the heart of Jerusalem and call to her that her time of service is ended, that her sin is at ned for. that she has received from the hand of the Lord double punishment for all her crimes.' A voice cries, 'Prepare in the wilderness a way for the Lord. Make a straight highway for our God across the desert. Let every valley be filled in, every mountain and hill be laid low, let every cliff become a plain, and the ridges a valley; then the glory of the Lord shall be revealed and all mankind shall see it; for the mouth of the Lord has spoken.' Go up on a high mountain, joyful messenger to Zion. Shout with a loud voice, joyful messenger to Jerusalem. Shout without fear, say to the towns of Judah, 'Here is your God.' Here is the Lord coming with power, his arm subduing all things to him. The prize of his victory is with him, his trophies all go before him. He is like a shepherd feeding his flock, gathering lambs in his arms, holding them against his breast and leading to their rest the mother ewes.

#### **Second Reading** 2 Pt 3:8-14

A reading from the second letter of St Peter

There is one thing, my friends, that you must never forget: that with the Lord, 'a day' can mean a thousand years, and a thousand years is like a day. The Lord is not being slow to carry out his promises, as anybody else might be called slow; but he is being patient with you all, wanting nobody to be lost and everybody to be brought to change his ways. The Day of the Lord will come like a thief, and then with a roar the sky will vanish, the elements will catch fire and fall apart, the earth and all that it contains will be burnt up.

Since everything is coming to an end like this, you should be living holy and saintly lives while you wait and long for the Day of God to come, when the sky will dissolve in flames and the elements melt in the heat. What we are waiting for is what he promised: the new heavens and new earth, the place where righteousness will be at home. So then, my friends, while you are waiting, do your best to live lives without spot or stain so that he will find you at peace.

# A reading from the Holy Gospel according to Mark

The beginning of the Good News about Jesus Christ, the Son of God. It is written in the book of the prophet Isaiah:

Look, I am going to send my messenger before you; he will prepare your way.

A voice cries in the wilderness: Prepare a way for the Lord, make his paths straight,

and so it was that John the Baptist appeared in the wilderness, proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins. All Judaea and all the people of Jerusalem made their way to him, and as they were baptised by him in the river Jordan they confessed their sins. John wore a garment of camel-skin, and he lived on locusts and wild honey. In the course of his preaching he said, 'Someone is following me, someone who is more powerful than I am, and I am not fit to kneel down and undo the strap of his sandals. I have baptised you with water, but he will baptise you with the Holy Spirit.'

# Message from Fr. Bob Bossini

Dear Friends,

In a homily for the 2nd Sunday of Advent, the then, Pope Benedict made the following point concerning the value of listening and responding to the word of God in our lives:

In the Season of Advent we too are called to listen to God's voice that cries out in the desert of the world through the Sacred Scriptures, especially when they are preached with the power of the Holy Spirit. Indeed, faith grows all the stronger the more it allows itself to be illumined by the divine word, by 'whatever', as the Apostle Paul reminds us, 'was written in former days (and) write for our instruction, that by steadfastness and by the encouragement of the Scriptures we might have hope' (Romans 15:4).

In this statement, Emeritus Pope Benedict challenges us to see the power of the message of the Scriptures in our lives. It is a challenge for us to remain with the word, pray with the word, and live the word's challenge that transcends time and place.

Placing ourselves in the Scripture readings becomes a tremendous way for us to extract their meaning and message for ourselves. On this, the Second Sunday of Advent I invite you to participate in a simple and yet powerful exercise. I invite you to re-read the first verses of our First Reading today from the prophet Isaiah [40:1-2]. As you read it I invite you to place your name within the reading as follows. You may also wish to place the name of a person who you know may be experiencing some difficulty at present:

'Console (here place your name or the name of a friend), console (him/her)', says your God. 'Speak to (here insert your name or the name of a friend) and call to (him/her) that (his/her) time of service is ended, that (his/her) sin is atoned for.'

These words of consolation and atonement are meant for us, as well as for the people of Jerusalem. As I recite these words with my name inserted in the passage or the name of a friend, I ask: what is the consolation that I need to experience this Advent? What level of consolation do I need to bring to the life of others and to our world? Can I name the sins in my life for which the Lord has made atonement?

John the Baptist is our model for this Sunday of Advent. While he preaches a message of urgency and repentance, he also points hopefully toward our salvation, Jesus Christ, our Lord.

We, too, are called to balance the tension between the urgency to be ready in our own lives for the coming of Christ along with the hope that God loves us and cares for us so much that through this same Christ He sends us the graces we need to carry out our vocation in the world with devotion and holiness.


Saint Francis de Sales [1567-1622] calls us to face the tensions, urgencies and upheavals of this life with "perfect confidence" and not to be anxious but "remain securely in the hand of God's providence" so that "he will help you in all situations'. Francis de Sales instructs us to "remain in peace; rid your imagination of whatever troubles you." Both Francis de Sales and Emeritus Pope Benedict remind us of the necessity of prayer and the Scriptures in our preparation for Christmas. Am I prepared to find consolation through prayer and the Scriptures in this coming week, and in so doing be a source of consolation to others?

# **COVID RESTRICTIONS UPDATE**

As of Monday 7 December 2020 the 4Sqr/m restriction has been lessened to 2Sqr/m.

Dear Brothers and Sisters of Fairfield,

After consultation with the Emmanuel Community the Archbishop has decided to send me to Paris for 2 years of full-time study for a Licentiate in Sacred Theology at the Faculté Notre-Dame within the Collège des Bernardins (<a href="https://g.page/CollegedesBernardins?share">https://g.page/CollegedesBernardins?share</a>). While always hard to predict a thesis topic, it may well be in Sacramental Theology around the Sacrament of Confession. For the duration of my studies I will be appointed as Assistant at St Nicholas des Champs (<a href="https://goo.gl/maps/ozbRtrgHJfFtj2V66">https://goo.gl/maps/ozbRtrgHJfFtj2V66</a>.), Paris 3me. I leave on the 15 January.

The point of this time is not simply to expand my sense of the beauty of the Lord and the faith to better share and explain it to others, but also to spend some time with my brother priests of the Community as a priest (something which I have only had very rare occasions to have), to deepen my sense of the charism of the Community, and to learn all I can from the parish priest + assistants of St Nicholas des Champs in how a parish is run, especially in the charism of the Community. This is an immensely useful opportunity for me personally and for my ability to serve you: please pray daily I come back 10 times a firecracker of the Heart of Jesus than when I left.

I am very sorry to leave: Fairfield is a university for people from other parts of Sydney to learn about immense generosity, fidelity and love.



Thankyou for your generous welcome of me in the parish and into your lives. It has been a joy, as well as a huge inspiration. Some people ask why they should trust the Church which sometimes does things so badly. This is a fair question. My answer is 1) because God does, 2) if you and I should keep receiving new chances from God then so should we be offering the same to others, and 3) that while there is undoubtedly much more corruption and evil in the Church than we know, there is always infinitely more good. This is visible to any priest at Fairfield, as he sees it is filled with quiet hidden people who live courageous lives in difficulty and suffering with great love. Fairfield, truly, is a city of hidden saints - and I thankyou for teaching me, a young priest, about the true meaning of life, and having me amongst you. You are good people, and this is a great parish.
