A reading from the first book of Samuel

Speak, O Lord, your servant is listening. Samuel was lying in the sanctuary of the Lord where the ark of God was, when the Lord called, 'Samuel!' Samuel!' He answered, 'Here I am'. Then he ran to Eli and said, 'Here I am, since you called me.' Eli said, 'I did not call. Go back and lie down.' So he went and lay down. Once again the Lord called, 'Samuel! Samuel!' Samuel got up and went to Eli and said, 'Here I am, since you called me.' He replied, 'I did not call you, my son; go back and lie down.' The Lord then came and stood by, calling as he had done before, 'Samuel! Samuel!' Samuel answered, 'Speak, Lord, your servant is listening.'

Samuel grew up and the Lord was with him and let no word of his fall to the ground.

A reading from the holy Gospel according to John

Jesus turned round, saw them following and said, 'What do you want?' They answered, 'Rabbi,' - which means Teacher - 'where do you live?' 'Come and see' he replied; so they went and saw where he lived, and stayed with him the rest of that day. It was about the tenth hour.

One of these two who became followers of Jesus after hearing what John had said was Andrew, the brother of Simon Peter. Early next morning, Andrew met his brother and said to him, 'We have found the Messiah' - which means the Christ – and he took Simon to Jesus. Jesus looked hard at him and said, 'You are Simon son of John; you are to be called Cephas' - meaning Rock.

Message from Fr. Bob Bossini

Dear Friends.

With this Sunday's liturgy we return to the Ordinary Sundays of the church's year. These Sundays are called Ordinary, not because they are not extraordinary, but because they follow an order beginning from week one through to week thirty-four. This year the Gospel for the majority of Sundays is taken from Mark.

These next six weeks are like an interval: we have just completed the season of Christmas and we look forward to the season of Lent, which begins on February 17th. The Scripture readings we have for these Sundays have to do with DISCIPLESHIP – the way in which we follow in the life and ways of Jesus Christ. Contrary to popular belief, discipleship is not just the domain of priests and religious or those who have consecrated themselves to God. It is open to all, as it accompanies the commitment made at our Baptism. It has to do with the way in which ordinary people live out and proclaim the Gospel. Jesus chose ordinary people who were involved in ordinary everyday activities to follow in his way. The important thing to remember is that the call to discipleship begins and ends with Christ. Our response needs to be one of faith that the God who calls us will also accompany us on the way.

The first reading [1 Samuel 3:3-10.19] – the call of Samuel - reminds us that we require the help of good spiritual people to assist us in discerning the will of God for us in life. Here Eli helps the young Samuel to respond to the Lord by simply saying: 'Speak Lord, your servant is listening' when he next hears God calling

The Gospel [John 1:35-42] tells of the call of the first disciples. There is a significant difference here in John's version of the calling of the first disciples compared to the way in which the other evangelists report the calling of the first disciples. Here we see that it is not Jesus who calls the first disciples. The call comes from two intermediaries: John the Baptist and Andrew. John the Baptist points his disciples towards Jesus – and they leave John's presence in order to follow Jesus. After staying some time with Jesus, Andrew brings his brother, Simon Peter to Jesus. We know the result of this encounter.

In reflecting on these two Scripture readings, we can ask ourselves some important questions. Firstly, in answer to the question asked of the disciples by Jesus: 'What do you want?' This question leads us to asking ourselves what are the deepest desires of my heart? What are the things that are important to me in life? What are the issues or goals that I seek?

Secondly, as we ponder the calling of Samuel, Andrew and Simon Peter we can ask: 'Who are the people who have led me to Jesus?' and 'Who are the people I have led to Jesus?' These questions lead me to ask how I discern the will of God in my life.

Most of us cannot achieve this on our own: we require the assistance of a spiritual guide or companion to help up to address the issues here. Similarly, have I led others through my companionship of them to be able to discern the will of God for them? In all this we need to remember that Samuel, Andrew and Simon Peter did not know what the Lord was asking of them. All that was required on their part was a deep, personal and intimate encounter with the Lord. The rest was disclosed to them in due time. As we begin this new year, we make a resolution to be more aware of God 'speaking' to us in prayer, through the Scriptures and through the lives of others, in and through our experiences, so that we can respond like Samuel: 'Speak Lord, your servant is listening.'




COVID-19 update

In keeping with NSW Health directives, anyone attending a church now must wear a face mask. Children under the age of 12 are exempt from this rule, but are encouraged to wear face masks where practicable. NSW Health can impose a \$200 fine on each individual failing to abide by this rule. Up to 100 people can attend Masses as well as other ceremonies including funerals, baptisms and weddings, providing a four square metre rule is observed. Churches are required to keep records of all attending Masses for contact tracing purposes.
