Message from Fr. Bob Bossini

Dear Friends.

We begin today the continual reading of the Gospel of Mark (Year 'B'). In today's Gospel we hear of Jesus' message, mission and calling of his first disciples [Mark 1:14-20]. His message is brief but in-depth. Jesus uses three words and expressions to emphasise his message and mission: announcing the Good News (the Kingdom of God), repent and believe. Jesus' proclamation of the Kingdom is indeed good news, as it marks the beginning of the destruction of Satan's hold over humanity. In Mark's first chapter which describes the events in the first day of Jesus' ministry, we see how he will bring about Satan's fall – by confronting the very suffering which is part of the human story: curing those possessed, marginalised and sick and welcoming them into God's Kingdom. Jesus then challenges his listeners to **repent** and **believe** in the good news he has just proclaimed. Repent here means more than just feeling sorry for our sins. It indicates a complete turnaround of our lives towards God - a changing of our priorities to that of God's. We have a hint of this in the first reading today [Jonah 3:1-5.10] where we see all the citizens of Nineveh – from the greatest to the least – turning from their sins through ritual fasting. So our repentance needs to be sustained through our belief and faith in Jesus as the Son of God.

Having made his proclamation, Jesus then goes about selecting his first disciples [v. 16-20]. In this process we need to take into consideration who he chose, when he chose them and the effects on those chosen. Jesus goes about selecting very ordinary people to follow him. Here we see two sets of brothers being chosen: Simon and Andrew and James and John. He calls them while they are about their ordinary everyday tasks – fishing and mending nets. They may have seen and heard of Jesus prior to this day, since Jesus was known to have preached around the Sea of Galilee where these men may have been working. That does not deter from the complete change that captures their response to Jesus' call: 'Follow me'.

In responding to Jesus we see that they are commissioned to carry out a particular task: to be fishers of people.

As we reflect on the calling of these first disciples we can appreciate that the process of their calling: *hearing* the voice of Jesus, *leaving* their past lives behind and *following* in the footsteps of Jesus, forms the basis of every Christian's spiritual life. This process of calling, leaving and following needs to be repeated in our lives continually.

Jesus continually calls us: to repentance and to belief—to a deeper and more intimate relationship with him. In listening to his call, we are urged to recognise and to leave our sinful past behind—to let go of whatever keeps us from living the life of the Kingdom. **St Francis de Sales (1567-1622),** one of our Parish's patron saints whose feast we celebrate today, tells us that we must not only repent from sin, but also from the desire for sin. Only when the individual can come to such a moment and decision in their life that true discipleship can begin—by faithfully and fully walking in the ways of Jesus—the values of the Kingdom: truth, hope, love, peace and integrity.

COVID-19 update


In keeping with NSW Health directives, anyone attending a church now must wear a face mask. Children under the age of 12 are exempt from this rule, but are encouraged to wear face masks where practicable. NSW Health can impose a \$200 fine on each individual failing to abide by this rule. Up to 100 people can attend Masses as well as other ceremonies including funerals, baptisms and weddings, providing a four square metre rule is observed. Churches are required to keep records of all attending Masses for contact tracing purposes.
