First Reading

Ex 16:2-4. 12-15

A reading from the book of Exodus

The whole community of the sons of Israel began to complain against Moses and Aaron in the wilderness and said to them, 'Why did we not die at the Lord's hand in the land of Egypt, when we were able to sit down to pans of meat and could eat bread to our hearts content! As it is, you have brought us to this wilderness to starve this whole company to death!'

Then the Lord said to Moses, 'Now I will rain down bread for you from the heavens. Each day the people are to go out and gather the day's portion; I propose to test them this way to see whether they will follow my law or not.'

'I have heard the complaints of the sons of Israel. Say this to them, "Between the two evenings you shall eat meat, and in the morning you shall have bread to your hearts content. Then you will learn that I, the Lord, am your God."' And so it came about: quails flew up in the evening, and they covered the camp; in the morning there was a coating of dew all round the camp. When the coating of dew lifted, there on the surface of the desert was a thing delicate, powdery, as fine as hoarfrost on the ground. When they saw this, the sons of Israel said to one another, 'What is that?' not knowing what it was. 'That' said Moses to them 'is the bread the Lord gives you to eat.'

Responsorial Psalm Ps 77:3-4. 23-25. 54. R. v.24

(R.) The Lord gave them bread from heaven.

- 1. The things we have heard and understood, the things our fathers have told us, we will tell to the next generation: the glories of the Lord and his might. (R.)

Second Reading

Eph 4:17, 20-24

A reading from the letter of St Paul to the Ephesians I want to urge you in the name of the Lord, not to go on living the aimless kind of life that pagans live.

Now that is hardly the way you have learnt from Christ, unless you failed to hear him properly when you were taught what the truth is in Jesus. You must give up your old way of life; you must put aside your old self, which gets corrupted by following illusory desires. Your mind must be renewed by a spiritual revolution so that you can put on the new self that has been created in God's way, in the goodness and holiness of the truth.

Gospel Acclamation Mt 4:4

Alleluia, alleluia! No one lives on bread alone, but on every word that comes from the mouth of God. Alleluia!

Gospel

Jn 6:24-35

A reading from the holy Gospel according to John When the people saw that neither Jesus nor his disciples were there, they got into boats and crossed to Capernaum to look for Jesus. When they found him on the other side, they said to him, 'Rabbi, when did you come here?' Jesus answered:

'I tell you most solemnly,
you are not looking for me
because you have seen the signs
but because you had all the bread you wanted to eat.
Do not work for food that cannot last,
but work for food that endures to eternal life,
the kind of food the Son of Man is offering you,
for on him the Father, God himself, has set his seal.'

Then they said to him, 'What must we do if we are to do the works that God wants?' Jesus gave them this answer, 'This is working for God: you must believe in the one he has sent.' So they said, 'What sign will you give to show us that we should believe in you? What work will you do? Our fathers had manna to eat in the desert; as scripture says: He gave them bread from heaven to eat.'

Jesus answered:

'I tell you most solemnly,
it was not Moses who gave you bread from heaven,
it is my Father who gives you the bread from heaven,
en,
the true bread;
for the bread of God
is that which comes down from heaven
and gives life to the world.'

'Sir,' they said 'give us that bread always.' Jesus answered:

'I am the bread of life.

He who comes to me will never be hungry; he who believes in me will never thirst.'

Communion Antiphon Wis 16:20

You have given us, O Lord, bread from heaven, endowed with all delights and sweetness in every taste.

Dear Friends,

The Book of Exodus tells of the liberation of the Israelites from slavery and persecution under Pharaoh in Egypt under the ministry of Moses. It recounts the great departure of these people from Egypt as they are guided by God, through Moses and Aaron to the Promised Land. It is not a simple or easy trek. In fact it is a journey fraught with both rebellion and faith. It relates some of the most intimate moments between God and his people as well as some of the most distant experiences. It describes the highs and lows of being in relationship with God. In Exodus there is a continual undercurrent of complaint on the part of the people. When things fail to turn out the way they expected, the people turn to Moses and grumble, quite stating that things were better when they were in Egypt. At least there they had enough food and water! They failed to understand that even though they were well provided for by the Egyptians, they still were their slaves!


Today's first reading [Exodus 16:2-4.12-15] seems to pick up in this theme. The people turn against Moses as they experience hunger in the desert. With a rather nostalgic tone, they recall the 'pans of meat' and 'the bread that they could eat until their hearts' content while they were in Egypt. They lament that Moses has 'brought us to this wilderness to starve the whole company to death!' They seem to have lost their faith in God who wished to provide for them. After all they had experienced the Lord's grandeur as he 'parted' the waters of the Red Sea, allowing them to pass through safely and having those same waters come down on the pursuing Egyptian army thus destroying them [cf Exodus 14]. In true prophetic fashion, Moses reminds the people that God has not abandoned them, but that he will continue to provide for them. And so, the Lord provides for the people quails and manna. The reading concludes with Moses reminding the people that this has all come from the hands of God: 'that is the bread the Lord gives you to eat' [Exodus 16:15].

There is a similar undercurrent in today's Gospel [John 6:24-35]. Jesus has fed the great multitude and has moved to another place for fear that were misinterpreting his actions by wanting to make him king. Now they re-join him at Capernaum. Jesus is quite blunt in telling them that they are seeking him for the wrong reasons: they have failed to interpret and understanding the true meaning of the feeding and they are simply after him for more bread to eat. They are operating on a material rather than spiritual dimension. He challenges them to see that they are seeking him for purely physical (selfish) reasons and not for the spiritual benefits that come from believing in him as the Son of God. Jesus makes reference to the Exodus experience which we read of in today's first reading, where God provides manna (bread) from heaven to feed the people. This in fact is food that will not last. He challenges them to see that He is offering them something deeper. Administrator

In answer to the request of the people for this food that will last always, Jesus presents himself as the Bread of Life and challenges the people to realise that all that is required from them to live forever is to come to Him and believe in Him: 'I am the bread of life. He who comes to me will never be hungry; he who believes in me will never thirst' [John 6:35].

This dialogue, then becomes for us an introduction to the significance of the Eucharist in our spiritual lives. Our participation at Mass and our reception of Jesus' Body and Blood allows us to never be hungry or thirsty. Our participation in the Eucharist calls for a strong act of faith. The more we participate in this sacrament worthily the more our faith is deepened and rewarded. As we next approach the Eucharist, we should do so with Jesus' words in our minds and hearts: this is truly the bread of God, which comes down from heaven and gives life to the world! [John 6:33]

THINK BEFORE YOU POST OR SHARE

Once you post or share something online, it can be very difficult to get back. It can even be shared or copied by someone else.



PRIVACY SETTINGS

VIDEO CALLS

RANDOM CONTACT

Always be on guard if someone randomly makes contact with you, especially if they seem to know a lot about you. Some things you see online can be too good to be true, always trust your instincts.



STRONG PASSWORDS

Make sure you set strong passwords which contain a lot of letters and are hard to guess. Never give your password away.
