## First Reading Jer 23:1-6

A reading from the prophet Jeremiah

'Doom for the shepherds who allow the flock of my pasture to be destroyed and scattered – it is the Lord who speaks! This, therefore, is what the Lord, the God of Israel, says about the shepherds in charge of my people: You have let my flock be scattered and go wandering and have not taken care of them. Right, I will take care of you for your misdeeds – it is the Lord who speaks! But the remnant of my flock I myself will gather from all the countries where I have dispersed them, and will bring them back to their pastures: they shall be fruitful and increase in numbers. I will raise up shepherds to look after them and pasture them; no fear, no terror for them any more; not one shall be lost – it is the Lord who speaks!

'See, the days are coming – it is the Lord who speaks –

when I will raise a virtuous Branch for David, who will reign as true king and be wise, practising honesty and integrity in the land. In his days Judah will be saved and Israel dwell in confidence. And this is the name he will be called: The Lord-our-integrity.'

For he is the peace between us, and has made the two into one and broken down the barrier which used to keep them apart, actually destroying in his own person the hostility caused by the rules and decrees of the Law. This was to create one single New Man in himself out of the two of them and by restoring peace through the cross, to unite them both in a single Body and reconcile them with God. In his own person he killed the hostility. Later he came to bring the good news of peace, peace to you who were far away and peace to those who were near at hand. Through him, both of us have in the one Spirit our way to come to the Father.

time even to eat. So they went off in a boat to a
lonely place where they could be by themselves.

pity on them because they were like sheep without a
shepherd, and he set himself to teach them at some
length.

Dear Friends,

Last week we heard of the disciples being sent out by Jesus to continue his mission. Today's Gospel [Mark 6:30-34] sees them returning from their endeavours eagerly telling Jesus 'all that they had done and taught'. Jesus invites them to come to a lonely place in order to recollect and rest for a while.

Jesus' invitation to his disciples can tell us something of the rhythm of the Christian spiritual and apostolic life. There is a certain flow involved here. We move continually from God to others, then back to God again. It is a flow from the active to the contemplative back to the active, and so on. It is a little like the rhythm of sleep and work. We cannot work effectively unless we have enough sleep, and we cannot sleep soundly unless we have worked hard enough to be tired.

This cycle presents us with some dangers, however. Firstly, there is the danger of being too constantly involved in activity to the extent that our purpose and endeavours can become blurred. This gives rise to the adage of 'burning the candle at both ends.' When we find ourselves in such a situation, we can be deaf to the voice of God, primarily because we do not allow ourselves enough time and space to be still. Our prayer may become non-existent or purely functionary.

The second danger is that we can become too withdrawn from life and activity. In such a situation we may find ourselves overly involved in devotional activities. These activities, as good as they are in themselves, can be removed from life and from the very fibre of our apostolic life and activity. In some ways our prayer can become a means of avoidance.

The ideal Christian life, then is a balance between the apostolic and the contemplative lifestyles. We need to allow our faith and motivations to be recharged through our connectedness to God through prayer and recollection. In this way we then become more willing and capable of entering into and serving the lives of others.

The ironical aspect of this Gospel episode is that while Jesus urges his disciples to come away for some quiet time, he in fact is hounded by the people and forced to minister to them. He began to teach them at great length. We need to recognise here that Jesus was always available to the need of the people. This does not mean that he is advertising a twenty-four-hour availability to people. We need to appreciate the fact that Jesus continually spent time in prayer to his Father.

The Gospel tells us that he used to go off in the early morning in order to be by himself and pray [see Mark 1:35].

The pity that Jesus had for the people when he referred to them as being like sheep without a shepherd, links in with today's first reading from Jeremiah, where we hear of God berating the leaders of Judah for abandoning the needs of the people in favour of looking after their own needs and desires. God promises that he will in fact shepherd them. True Christian service imitates the image of Jesus the Good Shepherd – the one who lays down his life for others. May we give of ourselves to others in true Christian service and activity, renewed by our willingness to be fed and nurtured by God's word.
