# **Gospel Jn 6:1-15**

A reading from the holy Gospel according to John
Jesus went off to the other side of the Sea of Galilee –
or of Tiberias – and a large crowd followed him, impressed by the signs he gave by curing the sick. Jesus climbed the hillside, and sat down there with his disciples. It was shortly before the Jewish feast of Passover.

Looking up, Jesus saw the crowds approaching and said to Philip, 'Where can we buy some bread for these people to eat?' He only said this to test Philip; he himself knew exactly what he was going to do. Philip answered, 'Two hundred denarii would only buy enough to give them a small piece each.' One of his disciples, Andrew, Simon Peter's brother, said, 'There is a small boy here with five barley loaves and two fish; but what is that between so many?' Jesus said to them, 'Make the people sit down.' There was plenty of grass there, and as many as five thousand men sat down. Then Jesus took the loaves, gave thanks and gave them out to all who were sitting ready; he then did the same with the fish, giving out as much as was wanted. When they had eaten enough he said to the disciples, 'Pick up the pieces left over, so that nothing gets wasted.' So they picked them up, and filled twelve hampers with scraps left over from the meal of five barley loaves. The people, seeing this sign that he had given, said, 'This really is the prophet who is to come into the world.' Jesus, who could see they were about to come and take him by force and make him king, escaped back to the hills by himself.

Dear Friends,

Beginning today and for some of following Sundays we interrupt the continual reading of Mark's Gospel, with excerpts from the sixth chapter of the Gospel of John. This chapter deals with the feeding of the multitude and has a very important and central theme of the Eucharist: with regard to belief in, and participation of, the Body and Blood of Christ. The gospel selection for these Sundays is as follows:

- · 17th Sunday (July 25th): John 6:1-15 ~ Multiplication of the loaves and fishes;
- $\cdot$  18th Sunday (August 1st): John 6: 24-35  $\sim$  Jesus' discourse with the crowd;
- $\cdot$  21st Sunday (August 22nd): John 6: 60-69  $\sim$  Dialogue between Jesus and his disciples; their difficulty in accepting Jesus' message; discourse with the Twelve (Jesus acclaimed as the bearing of the message of eternal life).

On August 8th and 15th, we celebrate the Solemnities of Mary of the Cross, MacKillop (Patron of Australia) and the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary, respectively.

Today's Gospel [John 6:1-15] begins with the feeding of the multitude, an episode which is related six times across the four Gospels [Matthew 14:13-21; 15:32 -39; Mark 6:30-44; 8:1-10; Luke 9:10-17 and John 6:1-15]. This incident must have been an important episode in the life of Jesus, and it must have influenced the early Christian community quite strongly. These accounts follow a similar pattern: this happens on the return of the disciples from their first missionary endeavour; Jesus invites them to be by themselves; the crowds follow them; Jesus has compassion on the crowd; suggestion by the disciples to send the crowd away; Jesus's countersuggestion that they feed the crowd; manifestation of the little food that they have; Jesus takes and blesses the little that they have; this is distributed among the crowd who have more than enough to eat.

In today's Gospel John is adamant to suggest that this occurs on the feast of the Jewish Passover, giving us overtones of Jesus' eventual sacrifice on Calvary as the Paschal Lamb [6:1-4]. Jesus engages in dialogue with two of this disciples, Philip and Andrew, one of whom suggests that a boy has some small amount of food that may be of assistance to the crowd [v 5-9]. Then follows the actual feeding of the crowd itself [v 10 -11] with the resultant gathering of what is left over [v 2 -13]. The episode concludes with an unsuccessful attempt by the people to make Jesus king, based on what they have experienced [v 14-15]. We can appreciate the emergence of a Eucharistic spirituality in these opening verses of John's sixth chapter. Firstly, there is a perceived need on the part of the people – they are many in number and there is little provision from which they can be fed. Jesus then becomes the means by which the people have their 'hunger' satisfied. Jesus achieves this by blessing the resources that are provided. This blessing on the part of Jesus allows an earnest need to be satisThis is what occurs at our Eucharist: the priest, in the name of Christ takes and blesses the bread and wine presented by the community. Their participation in this Eucharistic meal satisfies their spiritual hunger.

As we begin these weeks of reflection on John's sixth chapter, we are challenged to consider the ways in which the Eucharist challenges, satisfies and fulfills our spiritual needs. It challenges us also to consider the centrality of the Eucharist and the way in which we approach and participate worthily in this overwhelming and life-filled sacrament.
