Mk 7:31-37

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Mark
Returning from the district of Tyre, Jesus went by way
of Sidon towards the sea of Galilee, right through the
Decapolis region. And they brought him a deaf man
who had an impediment in his speech; and they asked
him to lay his hand on him. He took him aside in private, away from the crowd, put his fingers into the
man's ears and touched his tongue with spittle. Then
looking up to heaven he sighed; and he said to him,
'Ephphatha,' that is, 'Be opened.' And his ears were
opened, and the ligament of his tongue was loosened
and he spoke clearly. And Jesus ordered them to tell no
one about it, but the more he insisted, the more widely
they published it. Their admiration was unbounded. 'He

has done all things well,' they said 'he makes the deaf

hear and the dumb speak.'

Dear Friends,

There is always a special touch about the miracle stories of Jesus as they are depicted in the Gospels. They give us an insight into the person of Jesus, of his attitude towards people and they provide us with the means we need to adopt and nurture if we are to be true ministers in the mould of Jesus.

Today's miracle story [Mark 7:31-37] is prophetic as it is challenging. We see in this exchange between crowd and Jesus and between Jesus and the deaf mute a reference to the prophetic message of Isaiah, who foretold the things that would occur during the time of the Messiah: 'then the eyes of the blind shall be opened, the ears of the deaf unsealed, then the lame shall leap like the deer and the tongues of the dumb sing for joy' [Isaiah 35:5-6], which forms part of our first reading today.

For Isaiah the bringing back to health of those who are blind, dumb and lame is a way of especially celebrating the presence of God amongst us – they herald the Messianic age in a special and definitive way. In taking this miracle story and examining the process we arrive at the following pattern:

Jesus is travelling through the land regarded as Gentile – pagan land on the fringes of Palestine. It becomes a foretelling of the works that are to be carried out by his disciples as they go to the ends of the earth to preach, teach and cure.

The crowd intercedes for the deaf mute man: 'they brought him a deaf man who had an impediment in his speech; and they asked him to lay his hand on him' [Mark 7: 32]. This is not an unreasonable action, as the man could not speak for himself. It highlights the power and persuasion found in community intercessory prayer.

Jesus takes the man and 'aside, in private, away from the crowds' [v. 33]. Jesus does wish to turn this encounter into a public spectacle. He treats the man as an individual – in a personal and caring manner.

This personal and tender approach is further enhanced as we hear of Jesus placing his fingers in the man's ears and touched his tongue with spittle.

Jesus then looks up to heaven, sighs and gives the command 'Ephphatha' (be opened), causing the man's 'ears to be opened and the ligament of his tongue to be loosened [v. 35].

This encounter gives us an idea of how to go about relating and ministering to people within our community. It shows us the power and urgency of intercessory prayer as practiced by the community on behalf of those who require divine assistance. It challenges us to be able to recognise and give our assistance to those people who 'do not have a voice' in our community. The power of intercessory prayer should never be downplayed. It is a powerful tool that should be utilised.

This encounter also challenges us to be able to minister to those people in our community who have not yet heard the message of the Gospel – those whose ears have not been attuned to His word. Through our personal and pastoral approach of these people we can all them to hear the word and message and then to prepare them to evangelise by preaching the word and message they have just received and heard. Thirdly, it challenges us to see that we are always attuned to the voice of God, so that God's message may come to us and continue to be the basis of our evangelisation. Hearing and proclaiming the message of the Gospel is an essential and central part of our Baptismal vocation. May we never allow our ears to be deaf to God's voice. We are also challenged to be the channel through which God's mercy, forgiveness and healing can be directed to others. The challenge for us here is that we can bring these people to God through ministry and prayer.


