Mk 8:27-35

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Mark

Jesus and his disciples left for the villages round Caesarea Philippi. On the way he put this question to his dis-

ciples, 'Who do people say I am?' And they told him. 'John the Baptist,' they said, 'others Elijah; others again, one of the prophets.' 'But you,' he asked, 'who do you say I am? Peter spoke up and said to him, 'You are the Christ.' And he gave them strict orders not to tell anyone about him. And he began to teach them that the Son of Man was destined to suffer grievously, to be rejected by the elders and the chief priests and the scribes, and to be put to death, and after three days to rise again; and he said all this quite openly. Then, taking him aside, Peter started to remonstrate with him. But, turning and seeing his disciples, he rebuked Peter and said to him, 'Get behind me, Satan! Because the way you think is not God's way but man's.'He called the people and his disciples to him and said, 'If anyone wants to be a follower of mine, let him renounce himself and take up his cross and follow me. For anyone who wants to save his life will lose it; but anyone who loses his life for my sake, and for the sake of the gospel, will save it.'

Dear Friends,

Most of us love to be popular and well thought of by other people. It is part of our need to be the loved and accepted by others. But at times it is more difficult to play the 'popular' role than it is to stand by what one truly believes in. If we totally and completely rely on what people think of us, then we can become like a reed in the wind – we bend and twist to the whims of others and we can find ourselves beginning to lose our identity and individualism. We can become what other people want us to become. This is the fear of many politicians who so look to the results of opinion polls that in the end one does not know what they believe in or stand for anymore. Just consider the present situation with our State premiers fighting for the popularity vote with regard to their state's handling of the Covid-19 situation.

Something of this is occurring in our Gospel today [Mark 8:27-35]. This short passage is replete with meaning and symbolism. It comes at the very centre of Mark's Gospel. From here on Jesus is resolutely haunted by the true meaning of his mission – the Cross. There is no turning back from this point onwards. The conflict and arguments against him seem to become more evident and hostile. The religious leaders are intent on seeing to the destruction of Jesus once and for all.

In a very unusual place – Caesarea Philippi, a city known for its past worship of pagan gods and deity – Jesus ask his disciples two questions: firstly, who do the general public believe him to be; and secondly, who they believe him to be. The disciples give Jesus the usual answers from the public: they believe him to be a prophet, Elijah or John the Baptist. Even their own answer to the question brings no rebuke from Jesus. They announce, through Peter, that 'He is the Christ!' Jesus uses this answer to begin his teaching of what the mission and person of the Messiah is all about. Contrary to the preconceived ideas that the disciples held, of the Messiah being the one to rid their country of Roman rule and win for them a new era of peace, power and prosperity, Jesus puts it bluntly to the disciples that the Messiah - the Son of Man - 'was destined to suffer grievously, to be rejected by the elders and chief priests and the scribes, and to be put to death, and after three days to rise again' [v. 30]. Mark tells us that Jesus states this quite openly.

Here we experience something quite unusual. Peter takes Jesus - the disciple taking the Master aside and argues with him, wanting Jesus to change his tune and words. This rather strange action on the part of Peter has a significant basis. His image of the Messiah did not include 'suffering', 'rejection' or 'being put to death'. So, we can understand why he is so hostile to Jesus' words. Similarly, we can appreciate the harsh tone that Jesus takes with regard to Peter's response when he says:

'Get behind me Satan!' In many ways what Peter was echoing in his words gave rise in Jesus to the temptations and doubts he may have had regarding his God given mission. The impact of One who is innocent of all sin, dying for a sinful humanity must have resounded in Peter's remarks.

The next two verses [34-35] however show us something of the depth of Jesus' character and leadership. His mention that those who wish to be his disciples must take up their cross and follow in his ways alerts us to the fact that Jesus will never call us to do something that he himself is not prepared to undergo. In denying oneself, the person is saying 'yes' to Jesus and his ways. In this passage we find the central meaning of Mark's Gospel – the fact that redemption and salvation come to us through selfdenial and total surrender to the ways of Jesus and that secondly, like Peter we need to be appreciative of the highs and lows of our discipleship: our yes to Jesus means that we follow him through suffering and death to resurrection: 'those who lose their lives for my sake and for the sake of the Gospel will save it' [v.35].


