Mk 10:2-16

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Mark

Jesus was setting out on a journey when a man ran up, knelt before him and put this question to him, 'Good master, what must I do to inherit eternal life?' Jesus said to him, 'Why do you call me good? No one is good but God alone. You know the commandments: .

You must not kill; You must not commit adultery; You must not steal; You must not bring false witness; You must not defraud; Honour your father and mother.' And he said to him, 'Master, I have kept all these from my earliest days.' Jesus looked steadily at him and loved him, and he said, 'There is one thing you lack. Go and sell everything you own and give the money to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven; then come, follow me.' But his face fell at these words and he went away sad, for he was a man of great wealth

Jesus looked round and said to his disciples, 'How hard it is for those who have riches to enter the kingdom of God!' The disciples were astounded by these words, but Jesus insisted, 'My children,' he said to them, 'how hard it is to enter the kingdom of God! It is easier for a camel to pass through the eye of a needle than for a rich man to enter the kingdom of God.' They were more astonished than ever. 'In that case' they said to one another, 'who can be saved?' Jesus gazed at them. 'For men' he said, 'it is impossible, but not for God: because everything is possible for God.'

Peter took this up. 'What about us?' he asked him. 'We have left everything and followed you.' Jesus said, 'I tell you solemnly, there is no one who has left house, brothers, sisters, father, children or land for my sake and for the sake of the gospel who will not be repaid a hundred times over, houses, brothers, sisters, mothers, children and land – not without persecutions – now in this present time and, in the world to come, eternal life.'

Dear Friends,

Pope Francis reflected on the nature of money, riches, power and poverty in his preface to the book 'Poor for the Poor: The Mission of the Church' (January 2016) by Cardinal Gerhard Mueller, prefect of the Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith. Pope Francis states that:

Money is an instrument that in some ways ... prolongs and increases the capacity of human freedom, allowing it to work in the world, to act, to bear fruit... money and economic power" can "alienate man from man, confining him in an egocentric and egoistic horizon...When man lives habitually in solidarity, he is well aware that whatever he refuses to deliver, and keeps for himself, sooner or later will backfire on him...When man is understood this way and taught to live this way, his original, creaturely poverty is not felt anymore as handicap, but rather as a resource through which what enriches each person, and is freely given, is a good and a gift from which everyone can benefit...the positive light by which the Gospel invites us to see poverty," being the basis of the beatitude of "the poor in spirit.

In this sense the Pope is upholding the theme set in today's Gospel [Mark 10:17-31] as it speaks of the connection between discipleship (the following of Jesus) and the presence of riches, wealth and power in one's life. This Gospel passage is divided into three distinct sections:

V. 17-22 ~ a narrative about a good hearted and religious man who feels compelled to run after Jesus, but in the end has to refuse Jesus' invitation to follow him, because of his many possessions.

 $V.~23-27 \sim a$ private instruction by Jesus to his disciples and the difficultly of a rich person entering the Kingdom of God

V. 28-31 ~Jesus' promise to his disciples, that in return for their putting aside worldly goods and following him, they will be rewarded, now as well as in the eternal life.

There is an interesting thread flowing through the first section [10:17-22] of this Gospel that should stand as a warning to all of us. Once the man comes to Jesus, we should note the way in which Jesus presents the commandments to him. The list mentioned have all to do with human relationships. There is no mention of the commandments that deal with our relationship with God. This is more than simply an omission on the part of Jesus. It is Jesus' way of reminding the man that perhaps he has so valued his wealth that in fact he has subtly made his wealth and riches his god.

Pope Francis openly states that riches in themselves can be good and beneficial. However, when we become so attached to them, they can become the centre of our lives and as such can allow us to become blind to the needs of those around us. Administrator

Pope Francis' words, together with the words of Jesus in our Gospel today remind us that there can be elements in life that can keep us from fully and completely following in Jesus' ways. In all this we need to recognise Jesus' twofold promise held in the Gospel today. Firstly, we come to know the joy that comes with being more concerned about GIVING than RECEIVING. This comes from the freedom we experience when allowing God to penetrate our entire being and life not just facets of it. At this stage we experience the wealth that comes from those who are truly generous people. Secondly, we live each day with the belief and truth that we shall on day enjoy God's generosity forever in a life that will never end. So if we find ourselves asking like Peter: 'What's in it for us?', then we can realise that a truly generous life is one that is lived honestly, with purpose, meaning, direction and fullness – a life founded on Jesus' call, his words and God's grace. That is truly living the life of a disciple of Jesus.

CHURCH UPDATE

Q. When will the church be open for public worship?

The <u>first stage</u> (of the Roadmap) commences when <u>70%</u> of eligible people are fully vaccinated – this is expected to be <u>11 October</u>.

Even though we would be entitled on this date to open churches to the vaccinated only, following his recent consultation with us, the Archbishop has decided that we will patiently wait the estimated two further weeks until we reach 80% fully vaccinated before re-opening our churches to the public, and conducting public Masses etc. [From the Vicar General]

The live streaming of Masses at 9.30am will continue until we can open the Church to all people.
