One and the same spirit distributes different gifts as he chooses.

There is a variety of gifts but always the same Spirit; there are all sorts of service to be done, but always to the same Lord; working in all sorts of different ways in different people, it is the same God who is working in all of them. The particular way in which the Spirit is given to each person is for a good purpose. One may have the gift of preaching with wisdom given him by the Spirit; another may have the gift of preaching instruction given him by the same Spirit; and another the gift of faith given by the same Spirit; another again the gift of healing, through this one Spirit; one, the power of miracles; another, prophecy; another the gift of recognising spirits; another the gift of tongues and another the ability to interpret them. All these are the work of one and the same Spirit, who distributes different gifts to different people just as he chooses.

Gospel

Jn 2:1-11

A reading from the holy Gospel according to John

The first of the signs given by Jesus was at Cana in Galilee.

There was a wedding at Cana in Galilee. The mother of Jesus was there, and Jesus and his disciples had also been invited. When they ran out of wine, since the wine provided for the wedding was all finished, the mother of Jesus said to him, 'They have no wine.' Jesus said, 'Woman, why turn to me? My hour has not come yet.' His mother said to the servants, 'Do whatever he tells you.' There were six stone water jars standing there, meant for the ablutions that are customary among the Jews; each could hold twenty or thirty gallons. Jesus said to the servants, 'Fill the jars with water,' and they filled them to the brim. 'Draw some out now' he told them, 'and take it to the steward.' They did this; the steward tasted the water, and it had turned into wine. Having no idea where it came from – only the servants who had drawn the water knew – the steward called the bridegroom and said, 'People generally serve the best wine first, and keep the cheaper sort till the guests have had plenty to drink, but you have kept the best wine till now.'

This was the first of the signs given by Jesus: it was given at Cana in Galilee. He let his glory be seen, and his disciples believed in him.

Dear Friends,

When we consider the miracles stories recounted in the Gospels, we are not only recalling the miraculous actions of the historical Jesus, but we are also acknowledging the fact of what the Risen Lord can continue to do in our lives – especially in the lives of those who have faith.

In today's Gospel we have such a miracle story – the miracle of **Cana [John 2:1-11]**. This is the first of the miracle stories in John's Gospel, all of which occur in the section of his Gospel referred to as the **Book of Signs [chapters 2-11]**. What occurs in this section points to the moment of Glory in the life of Jesus – being raised up on the Cross in order to draw all people to himself. In the **Book of Signs** we have the events that mark the public ministry of Jesus – the miracle at Cana [2:1-11]; the Samaritan woman at the well [4:1-54]; healing of the paralytic [5:1-47]; the miracle of the loaves and fishes [6:5-15]; the miracle of the sea [6:16-21]; Jesus as the light of the world [8:12-30]; curing of the man born blind [9:1-41]; Jesus as the gateway and the Good Shepherd [10:1-42]; Jesus as the Resurrection and the Life [11:1-54]. These '*signs*' grow in intensity and in the depth of faith required from the people: from the changing of water into wine through to the proclamation of Himself as the Resurrection and the Life at the raising of Lazarus.

The miracle at Cana [2:1-11] is a story full of meaning and symbolism. It encourages us to see how this story can be played out in our own lives today. All of us, at some time, come to a point where '*the wine runs out*' [cf 2:3]. At this point in time we can find ourselves perhaps running out of zeal for the central elements of life: Oneness, Truth, Faith and Beauty. The cause of this can be many and varied. We could find ourselves experiencing some stagnation or trouble in life: a period where we seem to be getting nowhere or where the storms of life are encircling us just a little too often. It could be a time when we fail to find meaning in life or a time when there is an enormous change or challenge – health, job stability, and death of a loved one. Whatever the cause or the experience, all of us go through a time when *the wine has run out*. What do we do in such situations? We can either give in to the weight of the crisis or we can utilise our faith.

Our Gospel story today gives us the means by which we can overcome such situations. It was **Mary** who pointed out to Jesus the unenviable position that the newly married couple found themselves: no more wine for the feast. It was Mary who directed the stewards to Jesus, telling them to do everything that he asks. **Faith in Mary the Mother of God that leads to Jesus is the response that is asked of us on such occasions.**

If our faith in Mary and Jesus is strong, then we will indeed experience a '*wine*' that is much better than the original. The miracle of Cana can occur again in our lives if we are willing to turn to Mary and Jesus in faith during those moments when for us the wine has run out. The new wine we have to offer can certainly be if the form of the many different gifts that Paul speaks of in the second reading today [**1 Corinthians 12:4-11**] – different gift given to each person by the same Spirit for the good of all. Can I name the gift that has been allotted to me by the Spirit for the building up of my community? Am I prepared to utilise that gift?
