The Baptism of the Lord—Year C

Entrance Antiphon

A reading from the prophet Isaiah

The glory of the Lord shall be revealed, and all people shall see it.

'Console my people, console them' says your God.

'Speak to the heart of Jerusalem

and call to her

that her time of service is ended,

that her sin is atoned for,

that she has received from the hand of the Lord double punishment for all her crimes.'

A voice cries, 'Prepare in the wilderness a way for the Lord.

Make a straight highway for our God across the desert.

Let every valley be filled in,

every mountain and hill be laid low,

then the glory of the Lord shall be revealed

Now when all the people had been baptised and while Jesus after his own baptism was at prayer, heaven opened and the Holy Spirit descended on him in bodily shape, like a dove. And a voice came from heaven, 'You are my Son, the Beloved; my favour rests on you.'

Dear Friends,

We have come to the end of the Christmas Season with the celebration last week of the Epiphany of the Lord. We begin now the Ordinary cycle of the Liturgical year. It is fitting to begin this ordinary cycle with the **Baptism of the Lord** (the First Sunday in Ordinary Time) since for us Baptism – our Baptism – is the beginning of our Christian life.

We can ask – why did Jesus present himself for baptism under John the Baptist? Was it to please his mother Mary, or the religious people of the time? Considering that John's baptism was for the repentance of sin, it becomes even more unusual to think that Jesus, the sinless one, makes himself available for this ritual that cleanses from sin. Here we need to consider the theological and the symbolic significance of Jesus' Baptism.

In Jesus' life, as in any person's life, there are certain episodes that in many ways dictate the passage and direction that a person's life will take. One such event in the life of Jesus was the time he spent with the doctors of the law in the Temple – the time in which he was separated from his parents and they spent three days looking for him [Luke 2:41-50]. At this time he came to an awareness of his special, unique and intimate relationship with God. When his parents finally 'found' him in the Temple his answer to Mary's anxious question concerning his actions was simply to remind her that he must be about his Father's business. And indeed, it is the Father's business that directs and drives Jesus' life and mission. This is highlighted when we hear him state quite openly at the Garden of Gethsemane: 'Nevertheless, let Your will be done, not mine' [Luke 22:42].

During the next eighteen or so years – what is traditionally called the 'hidden years' - is the time Jesus spent maturing under the parentage and guidance of Joseph and Mary. During this period he looked for signs that would indicate that the time had arrived for him to move on from his home in Nazareth and to begin his mission among the people.


The arrival of John baptising people and calling them to repentance – a process that initiated a movement among the people towards God – would have been an indication to Jesus that this time had come. Jesus then comes to John for baptism, not for the repentance for sin, but as a means for him to be associated with the people to whom he was called to minister. One might say that his baptism was further deepening of his Incarnation – his taking on our human condition. There is no account of the actual baptism of Jesus in today's Gospel [Luke 3:15-16.21-22] just the mention that Jesus had a personal and intimate experience of God: the descent of the Holy Spirit and God's affirmation of Jesus as God's Son, the beloved on whom God's favour rests after his baptism and while he was at prayer.

Jesus' baptism then becomes a time for approval and recognition by the Father of Jesus and his commissioning into public ministry. What follows this incident is the genealogy of Jesus [Luke 3:23-38] and his preparation time in the desert [Luke 4:1-13].

Jesus' baptism becomes a reminder to us of our own Baptismal call. This is the time when we are claimed by God as His children and are commissioned to live a life of faith and grace. It is a time when the person being baptised will with the assistance of the practicing community choose the ways of grace, truth and faith and not the ways of sin. Today's feast is a good opportunity for us all to not only renew our baptismal commitment but also to consider the elements and challenge of that commitment. What am I doing to deepen and strengthen my baptismal call and commitment?


