I have appointed you as prophet to the nations. In the days of Josiah, the word of the Lord was addressed to me, saying,

'Before I formed you in the womb I knew you; before you came to birth I consecrated you; I have appointed you as prophet to the nations. So now brace yourself for action. Stand up and tell them all I command you. Do not be dismayed at their presence, or in their presence I will make you dismayed. I, for my part, today will make you into a fortified city, a pillar of iron. and a wall of bronze to confront all this land: the kings of Judah, its princes, its priests and the country people. They will fight against you but shall not overcome you, for I am with you to deliver you – it is the Lord who speaks.'

Second Reading

1 Cor 12:31 – 13:13

A reading from the first letter of St Paul to the Corinthians

There are three things that last: faith, hope and love; and the greatest of these is love.

Be ambitious for the higher gifts. And I am going to show you a way that is better than any of them.

If I have all the eloquence of men or of angels, but speak without love, I am simply a gong booming or a cymbal clashing. If I have the gift of prophecy, understanding all the mysteries there are, and knowing everything, and if I have faith in all its fullness, to move mountains, but without love, then I am nothing at all. If I give away all that I possess, piece by piece, and if I even let them take my body to burn it, but am without love, it will do me no good whatever.

Love is always patient and kind; it is never jealous; love is never boastful or conceited; it is never rude or selfish; it does not take offence, and is not resentful. Love takes no pleasure in other people's sins but delights in the truth; it is always ready to excuse, to trust, to hope, and to endure whatever comes.

Love does not come to an end. But if there are gifts of prophecy, the time will come when they must fail; or the gift of languages, it will not continue for ever; and knowledge – for this, too, the time will come when it must fail. For our knowledge is imperfect and our prophesying is imperfect; but once perfection comes, all imperfect things will disappear. When I was a child, I used to talk like a child, and think like a child, and argue like a child, but now I am a man, all childish ways are put behind me.

Now we are seeing a dim reflection in a mirror; but then we shall be seeing face to face. The knowledge that I have now is imperfect; but then I shall know as fully as I am known.

In short, there are three things that last: faith, hope and love; and the greatest of these is love.

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke

Jesus, like Elijah and Elisha, was not sent only to the Jews. Jesus began to speak in the synagogue, 'This text is being fulfilled today even as you listen.' And he won the approval of all, and they were astonished by the gracious words that came from his lips.

They said, 'This is Joseph's son, surely?' But he replied, 'No doubt you will quote me the saying, "Physician, heal yourself" and tell me, "We have heard all that happened in Capernaum, do the same here in your own countryside." And he went on, 'I tell you solemnly, no prophet is ever accepted in his own country.

'There were many widows in Israel, I can assure you, in Elijah's day, when heaven remained shut for three years and six months and a great famine raged throughout the land, but Elijah was not sent to any one of these: he was sent to a widow at Zarephath, a Sidonian town. And in the prophet Elisha's time there were many lepers in Israel, but none of these was cured, except the Syrian, Naaman.'

When they heard this everyone in the synagogue was enraged. They sprang to their feet and hustled him out of the town; and they took him up to the brow of the hill their town was built on, intending to throw him down the cliff, but he slipped through the crowd and walked away.

Dear Friends,

What comes to mind when you think of word 'prophet'? Quite often we can think of someone who predicts the future or at least has some insight into future events. We can think of a person who predicts 'doom and gloom' upon the world, hence the term 'prophet of doom.' Within the Biblical tradition the prophet is not so much the person who predicts the future. The prophet is the one who is called by God to be involved in a special mission. The prophet, from a biblical perspective is a person who sometimes not only has to foretell things but has to tell people some realities about their behaviour and their relationship with God. This message can at time be fairly unpopular, especially when the prophet has the task of chastising the people for their infidelity to God's ways. Such a message can fall on irritated and sometimes unresponsive ears.

Our first Reading from the prophet Jeremiah [1:4-5.17-19] gives the impression that being a prophet of God is not an easy task. God speaks to Jeremiah in the following words: 'I have appointed you as prophet to the nations, so brace yourself for action...they will fight against you but shall not overcome you for I am with you to deliver you.' This does not amount to a very appealing advertisement for taking on the role of a prophet!

Today's Gospel [Luke 4:21-30] is a continuation of last week's Gospel where we saw Jesus reading from the prophet Isaiah and proclaiming himself as the fulfilment of the very prophecy he was reading. Although Luke tells us that Jesus 'won the approval of all, and they were astonished by the gracious words that came from his lips' [v.22], he then relates that the tide of approval turns against Jesus as they begin to question the very claims Jesus was making. How can this man say that he is the Messiah when we know him to be the carpenter's son and we also know and have seen his family? He must be having us on. These are the thoughts that the people of Nazareth have and so, in failing to accept Jesus' message they send him away from there in the most drastic manner possible - they drive him to the top of the city's hill wanting to throw him off. Jesus further inflames the situation by recalling two events concerning prophets from the Old Testament: Elijah's ministry to the widow of Zarephath [1 Kings 17:7-15] and Elisha's dealings with the Syrian leper, Naaman [2 Kings 5:1-27]. In both episodes foreigners come to faith through the work of these two prophets. Through the mention of these two episodes, Jesus stresses the fact that non-Jews are more able and ready to recognise God's ways than are the Chosen People. No wonder the Synagogue explodes into anger. As they try to do away with him, Jesus of course eludes them and continues his mission elsewhere. From Jeremiah and Luke we see that the prophet's lot is not a simple and easy existence. One has to stand and deliver quite often an unpopular message to an unreceptive people. But in all this the presence and strength of God is guaranteed. Through our Baptism we have been given a share in the prophetic mission of Jesus. In fact during the Baptismal rite when we are anointed with the oil of Chrism, the celebrant makes reference to our being anointed as Christ was anointed 'Priest, Prophet and King'.

To us belongs the mission of not only living out the elements of God's message and word, but also to bring it into the lives of those we meet. St Paul assures us of a simple, thorough and pure way of doing this – through love. He speaks of a type of love that is never *jealous*, conceited, that will never fail or be boastful - a love that will never come to an end. Had the people of Nazareth lived by the elements of this type of love, they may not have reacted to Jesus' message in such a harsh and militant manner. The challenge for us is that firstly, we need to be the bearers of the type of love that Paul speaks of in the Second Reading and that secondly, we need to continually and openly preach the message of the Gospel even when the occasion is difficult and when it may not be received wholeheartedly. The tradition of the Biblical prophets and the life of Jesus show us that God will never abandon us in these most difficult times. All that is asked of us if to remain faithful to God's ways and to live in God's love.
