#### First Reading

Bar 5:1-9

A reading from the prophet Baruch Jerusalem – God will show you splendour. Jerusalem, take off your dress of sorrow and distress, put on the beauty of the glory of God for ever, wrap the cloak of the integrity of God around you, put the diadem of the glory of the Eternal on your head: since God means to show your splendour to every nation under heaven,

since the name God gives you for ever will be,

'Peace through integrity, and honour through devotedness'.

Arise, Jerusalem, stand on the heights

and turn your eyes to the east:

see your sons reassembled from west and east

at the command of the Holy One, jubilant that God has remembered them.

Though they left you on foot, with enemies for an escort,

All people shall see the salvation of God. In the fifteenth year of Tiberius Caesar's reign, when Pontius

Pilate was governor of Judaea, Herod tetrarch of Galilee, his brother Philip tetrarch of the lands of Ituraea and Trachonitis, Lysanias tetrarch of Abilene, during the pontificate of Annas and Caiaphas, the word of God came to John son of Zechariah, in the wilderness. He went through the whole Jordan district proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins, as it is written in the book of the sayings of the prophet Isaiah:

A voice cries in the wilderness: Prepare a way for the Lord, make his paths straight. Every valley will be filled in, every mountain and hill be laid low, winding ways will be straightened and rough roads made smooth. And all mankind shall see the salvation of God.

Voting cards have been placed outside on the table for the 6PM Sunday Mass to be reintroduced in 2022. Dear Friends,

On May 21st 1972, in St Peter's Basilica there was a large crowd admiring the statute of the Pieta sculptured some five hundred years ago [1498] by Michelangelo [1475-1564], portraying Mary holding the dead body of Jesus on her lap. Suddenly, there was a commotion in the crowd, and a man leapt over the railing and attacked the statue with a mallet, severely damaging the image. Before he was overpowered he had hit the statue about fifteen times, leaving 50 large pieces of marble and some 150 smaller pieces strewn over the floor. The damage indeed was very serious Mary's left arm was broken off at the elbow and the fingers destroyed. Part of the nose was smashed. Her veil and cheek were scarred in several places and her left eye was badly damaged. The damage was thought to have left the statue in an irreparable state. The media even reported that the statue was ruined and beyond repair. A great work of art that had lasted five hundred years was damaged within a matter of moments. The head of the Vatican museum thought differently. He gathered a group of seven scientists and restorers who spent some ten months, gathering, labelling and numbering the various pieces. After some gruelling and painstaking work, the Pieta was finally restored and on March 25<sup>th</sup>, 1973 – the Solemnity of the Annunciation – it was again placed on public display, only this time behind bulletproof glass. A seemingly hopeless situation was, through patience and goodwill restored.

The liturgical readings for this Second Sunday of Advent [Baruch 5:1-9 and Luke 3:1-6] challenge us to recognise the place that hope has within our fractured world. The prophet Baruch, who was the secretary of Jeremiah, preached during one of the most hopeless and despairing periods of Israel's existence – the Exile to Babylon. Yet in the midst of this period of desolation and dejection, Baruch was able to preach to the people a message of hope. He says to them: 'take off your dress of sorrow and distress, put on the beauty of the glory of God forever, wrap the cloak of the integrity of God around you, put on the diadem of the glory of the Eternal on your head.'

Faith is the predominant virtue that is asked of us on this, the Second Sunday of Advent. In fact, the second purple candle which is lit in the Advent Wreath represents peace which stems from faith. Faith, together with hope, the meanings of the first candle, are the virtues that allow us to continue to live by and believe in God's goodness and presence amid the uncertainties of life. Like Baruch's community we too are facing a troubled world - one which seems to shun the very presence of God through violence, injustice, abuse of all kind, a general lack of respect for people and the never ending demands of this so called pandemic. Amid this world we are called to a supernatural faith and hope, one which allows us to 'prepare a way for the Lord' as Luke's gospel reminds us today. It is a faith and hope that leads to a peace of the heart – an internal or spiritual peace. John the Baptist's message of straightening the paths, filling in the valleys, laying low all mountains, straightening and smoothing

over the rough and windings roads, becomes the metaphorical way of challenging us to prepare a way for the Lord, so that his salvation may be seen and experienced by all people.

Our second reading today [Philippians 1:3-6.8-11] suggests that for us to accomplish this, we need to ensure that all the obstacles in our life stopping us from responding to the grace of God are removed. We need to make straight the path of the Lord to us. Paul, in speaking to the Philippians gives us an idea of what we have to do: ensure 'that your love for each other may increase more and more and never stop improving your knowledge and deepening your perception so that you can always recognise what is best...to become pure and blameless.' Our hope is based on our belief that God is present and working in our world for the good of all. The extent of our belief in this will determine how we are to understand the coming of God at Christmas. Our liturgy today opens up for is the possibility of a newness of life based on God. It challenges us to discard the elements of misery and mourning and to vest ourselves in the splendour of God's glory. This possibility of newness is obtained through our preparedness to seek repentance for the forgiveness of our sins, as John the Baptist reminds us in today's Gospel. Sin is dispelled only through love and hope. As we light our second candle of a faith-filled peace on our Advent Wreath, may we allow our lives to be guided and strengthened by belief in God's love and goodness.




