So Joseph set out from the town of Nazareth in Galilee and travelled up to Judaea, to the town of David called Bethlehem, since he was of David's House and line, in order to be registered together with Mary, his betrothed, who was with child. While they were there the time came for her to have her child, and she gave birth to a son, her first-born. She wrapped him in swaddling clothes, and laid him in a manger because there was no room for them at the inn

In the countryside close by there were shepherds who lived in the fields and took it in turns to watch their flocks during the night. The angel of the Lord appeared to them and the glory of the Lord shone round them. They were terrified, but the angel said, 'Do not be afraid. Dear Friends,

In 2018, Peter Westmore, the then Editor of **Newsweek-ly** wrote the following:

In one of his prophetic utterances quoted by the Evangelist St John, Jesus expressed this both memorably and beautifully: "Greater love than this has no man, that he lay down his life for his friends." While Jesus laid down the foundations of personal perfection as a way of attaining the Kingdom of God, he was also acutely aware that these principles were the foundation of a just society, enjoining those in authority to exercise it in the interests of their people. One of the great contributions of Christianity to human society has been the application of these principles to public policy, to government and to law. It has been said that every society is held together either by force or by consent. It is the great contribution of Christianity that it has established the universal principles that bind us together for the good of every person, singly and collectively. That is well worth celebrating at Christmas.

When we come to the completion of our Christmas festivities: when the Christmas tree is dismantled, presents are exchanged, numerous dinners have been attended, we can begin to forget about Christmas and its challenging message until we do it all again in twelve months.

Our celebration of Christmas needs to be seen as a time for us to reinforce and deepen those elements in our that we call Christian: justice, peace, integrity, love, sacrifice. Although these attributes can be lived out in the life of any person, they are essential elements for people who call themselves Christian. Christmas is an opportunity for us to give thanks for the gifts brought into our lives and society through the birth of Jesus, and how his teaching has challenged and changed the world -and still does so.

One of the prominent images of our Christmas celebration is the Nativity scene. The Crib becomes a means of departure rather than arrival; of a mission that emanates from our adoration; of moving into apostolic activity through our contemplation of it. The Crib should inspire us to embrace the Christ-Child and to bring Him to a waiting world.

Recall what happened on that first Christmas night. Mary and Joseph made their way from Nazareth to Bethlehem, the city of David and eventually found a place outside of the city. And there, she gave birth to her son, her first born. And she wrapped him in swaddling clothes and laid him in a manger because there was no room at the inn. The first news of this birth is given not to the Emperor or the governor or to any person of position or power, but to mere shepherds who had been tending their flock in the countryside close by. These shepherds experience a vision of angels who, while calming their fears announce to them the news of great joy. Luke tells us that after the vision, rather than discussing if anyone had spiked their tea, they say: 'let us go to Bethlehem and see this accomplished word that the Lord has made known to us. And they went quickly to find everything as the angels had proclaimed' [2:15]. Luke tells us that they 'spoke publicly concerning the word that had been spoken to them about this child' and 'everyone who heard was astonished at the things told to them by the shepherds' [2:17 -18]. After this encounter with the Christ Child the shepherds go back to their fields 'glorifying and praising God for everything they had heard and seen, just as it was spoken to them' [2:20]. They hear, they see, they give glory to God. In this way the shepherds prefigure, not the apostles, but those who will later encounter the adult Jesus, hear and see him and go away praising God for what they have seen and heard. And isn't that what the beginning of discipleship is all about? Isn't that what the intention of St Francis of Assisi was in introducing the Crib into our Christmas devotion and ritual: that we come, hear and see Jesus and go away giving glory and praise to God by awakening in ourselves and others the same message we have heard and seen?

This year, we have to unique opportunity of celebrating Christmas and the Feast of the Holy Family in two successive days. It becomes a time for us to remember the centrality of the family in our life. Our first and second readings remind us of what that duty entails, as members of Christian families. The reading from Ecclesiasticus [3:2-6.12-14], from the Wisdom tradition, urges us to realise the mutual responsibility that should be present in any family that calls itself Christian. It mentions in particular the rewards that comes to the son who takes care of his father. We need to read this within the context of a patriarchal society, where the mother was taken care of by her father and brothers. In being faithful to that role the son 'amasses a fortune': happiness with his own children; his prayers will be heard; he will have long life.

The letter of Paul to the Colossians [3:12—21] again spells out how a Christian needs to relate to others, especially within the relationship of family.

All this occurs – and needs to be lived out – because one is bearing the name of Christ. Paul does not simply say that one must do these things as a mere veneer – an outward show, but because this type of activity is conducive to being a Christian. One recognises a Christian by his or her actions. What are those elements of behaviour? Paul lists them as follows: Clothed with sincere compassion: In kindness and humility; Gentleness and patience; Bear with one another; Forgive one another as soon as a quarrel begins.

The presence of the Covid virus over the past eighteen months has shown us the value and importance of family life and dynamics. Periods of time spent in isolation preventing family members from even visiting each other have placed incredible strain on people — both physically and mentally. As we celebrate the Holy Family of Nazareth, perhaps we can contemplate our own families, give thanks to God for them and renew our commitment to allow our presence to enrich and enhance our families, and recommit to making our families places of true Christian formation.

May I take this opportunity, together with the Parish Team, to wish you all a very Happy and Holy Christmas and a hope-filled New Year.

Bear with one another; forgive each other as soon as a quarrel begins. The Lord has forgiven you; now you must do the same. Over all these clothes, to keep them together and complete them, put on love. And may the peace of Christ reign in your hearts, because it is for this that you were called together as parts of one body. Always be thankful.

Let the message of Christ, in all its richness, find a home with you. Teach each other, and advise each other, in all wisdom. With gratitude in your hearts sing psalms and hymns and inspired songs to God; and never say or do anything except in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God the Father through him.

Wives, give way to your husbands, as you should in the Lord. Husbands, love your wives and treat them with gentleness. Children, be obedient to your parents always, because that is what will please the Lord. Parents, never drive your children to resentment or you will make them feel frustrated.

Gospel

Lk 2:41-52

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke His parents found him in the temple, sitting among the learned men, listening to them.

Every year the parents of Jesus used to go to Jerusalem for the feast of the Passover. When he was twelve years old, they went up for the feast as usual. When they were on their way home after the feast, the boy Jesus stayed behind in Jerusalem without his parents knowing it. They assumed he was with the caravan, and it was only after a day's journey that they went to look for him among their relations and acquaintances. When they failed to find him they went back to Jerusalem looking for him everywhere.

Three days later, they found him in the Temple, sitting among the doctors, listening to them, and asking them questions; and all those who heard him were astounded at his intelligence and his replies. They were overcome when they saw him, and his mother said to him, 'My child, why have you done this to us? See how worried your father and I have been, looking for you.' 'Why were you looking for me?' he replied. 'Did you not know that I must be busy with my Father's affairs?' But they did not understand what he meant.

He then went down with them and came to Nazareth and lived under their authority. His mother stored up all these things in her heart. And Jesus increased in wisdom, in stature, and in favour with God and men.
