For anyone who is in Christ, there is a new creation; the old creation has gone, and now the new one is here. It is all God's work. It was God who reconciled us to himself through Christ and gave us the work of handing on his reconciliation. In other words, God in Christ was reconciling the world to himself, not holding men's faults against them, and he has entrusted to us the news that they are reconciled. So we are ambassadors for Christ; it is as though God were appealing through us, and the appeal that we make in Christ's name is: be reconciled to God. For our sake God made the sinless one into sin, so that in him we might become the goodness of God.

Gospel

Lk 15:1-3. 11-32

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke

Your brother here was dead and has come to life. The tax collectors and the sinners were all seeking the company of Jesus to hear what he had to say, and the Pharisees and the scribes complained. 'This man' they said 'welcomes sinners and eats with them.' So he spoke this parable to them:

'A man had two sons. The younger said to his father, "Father, let me have the share of the estate that would come to me.' So the father divided the property between them. A few days later, the younger son got together everything he had and left for a distant country where he squandered his money on a life of debauchery.

'When he had spent it all, that country experienced a severe famine, and now he began to feel the pinch, so he hired himself out to one of the local inhabitants who put him on his farm to feed the pigs. And he would willingly have filled his belly with the husks the pigs were eating but no one offered him anything. Then he came to his senses and said, "How many of my father's paid servants have more food than they want, and here am I dying of hunger! I will leave this place and go to my father and say: Father, I have sinned against heaven and against you; I no longer deserve to be called your son; treat me as one of your paid servants." So he left the place and went back to his father.

'While he was still a long way off, his father saw him and was moved with pity. He ran to the boy, clasped him in his arms and kissed him tenderly. Then his son said, "Father, I have sinned against heaven and against you. I no longer deserve to be called your son." But the father said to his servants, "Quick! Bring out the best robe and put it on him; put a ring on his finger and sandals on his feet. Bring the calf we have been fattening, and kill it; we are going to have a feast, a celebration, because this son of mine was dead and has come back to life; he was lost and is found." And they began to celebrate.

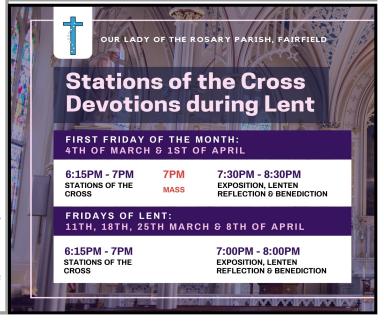
'Now the elder son was out in the fields, and on his way back, as he drew near the house, he could hear music and dancing. Calling one of the servants he asked what it was all about. "Your brother has come" replied the servant "and your father has killed the calf we had fattened because he has got him back safe and sound." He was angry then and refused to go in, and his father came out to plead with him; but he answered his father, "Look, all these years I have slaved for you and never once disobeyed your orders, yet you never offered me so much as a kid for me to celebrate with my friends. But for this son of yours, when he comes back after swallowing up your property – he and his women – you kill the calf we had been fattening."

Gospel Antiphon

Lk 15: 32

You must rejoice, my son, for your brother was dead and has come to life; he was lost and is found.



Dear Friends,

With today's Gospel we encounter perhaps the best known and most challenging of Luke's parables: the Prodigal Son [Luke 15: 11-13]. The parable is told in answer to the criticism of the scribes and Pharisees that Jesus spends his time with tax collectors and sinners. It is a parable that presents to us the immeasurable and deep compassion and mercy that God has for us and the two responses that we can have to that boundless mercy. It is also good to keep in mind that in its original presentation at the time of Jesus, this parable was meant to shock the audience. In our contemporary world it may have lost some of its punch. A quick examination of the three main characters in the story can allow this to happen.

Firstly we have the **younger son**. Without any reason he asks his father for his share of the inheritance. In doing so he is publicly claiming his father to be dead to him, after all inheritance is only granted on the death of the owner. In reaching rock bottom after squandering his entire inheritance and abasing himself by virtually living with pigs (an abhorrent image to any Jew) he decides to return to his father. Note that he is ready to present himself not as a repentant son, but as a hired servant. He has truly come to his senses and reached a level of repentance and contrition, as he mentally composes his 'act of contrition' to his father [Luke 15:17-19].

Secondly, note the **father's response** to his son's return. We have the impression from **v. 20b** that he goes to the entrance of his estate everyday expecting his son to return. As he sees him in the distance he acts in an unexpected manner. He runs to embrace his son. He does not let his son finish his sentence of remorse, but welcomes him wholeheartedly and unconditionally. Not only that but he reinstates him, not as a hired hand, as Jesus' audience would expect, but as son and orders a festival to celebrate the occasion of his son's return.

Thirdly we have the **elder son**. He is the one who carries out his duties faithfully every day; asks for nothing but steadily does what is required of him. In fact when we encounter him in the parable he is 'in the fields' attending to his duties [v. 25]. But we see a deeper and more intense, and perhaps sinister side of this loyal son when he discovers the reason for the festivity. He cannot bring himself to rejoice in his brother's return. He cannot be the bearer of the mercy that the father has shown the younger son. In fact he even refrains from referring to him as his own brother. He calls him 'your son' [v. 30], thus severing all sibling connections with the younger son. We assume that he stands his ground even as his father implores him to rejoice in the brother's return – he will not join in the celebration, because of his lack of forgiveness and mercy . He stands in grim opposition to the unconditional love, mercy and pardon given by the father.

This parable teaches us that **God's mercy and for**giveness (as seen through **the father**) is always available to us, and more so when we reach rock bottom and **truly repent of our sinfulness (younger son)**. We can also **fail to** rejoice in God's mercy and forgiveness both for ourselves and for others and remain in our self-centred and closed mindset (older brother). We began this Lenten season with a call to repentance and a turning towards the Gospel. May we truly examine our lives and rejoice in the mercy of our God by experiencing that mercy through the Sacrament of Reconciliation. This 4th Sunday of Lent is universally celebrated as 'Rejoicing' Sunday – a time for us to give thanks and rejoice in God's mercy and forgiveness of our sinful ways. Last Sunday we heard of the urgency of repenting of our sinful ways, but also of the great mercy and compassion that God offers us, as we heard the parable of the fig tree [Luke 13:1-9]. God awaits our return to Him. This journey begins by recognising our sinfulness and our need for God's mercy.
