The wild beasts will honour me, jackals and ostriches, because I am putting water in the wilderness (rivers in the wild) to give my chosen people drink. The people I have formed for myself will sing my praises.

Second Reading

Phil 3:8-14

A reading from the letter of St Paul to the Philippians

Because of Christ I look upon everything else as useless in order to gain him.

I believe nothing can happen that will outweigh the supreme advantage of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord. For him I have accepted the loss of everything, and I look on everything as so much rubbish if only I can have Christ and be given a place in him. I am no longer trying for perfection by my own efforts, the perfection that comes from the Law, but I want only the perfection that comes through faith in Christ, and is from God and based on faith. All I want is to know Christ and the power of his resurrection and to share his sufferings by reproducing the pattern of his death. That is the way I can hope to take my place in the resurrection of the dead. Not that I have become perfect yet: I have not yet won, but I am still running, trying to capture the prize for which Christ Jesus captured me. I can assure you my brothers, I am far from thinking that I have already won. All I can say is that I forget the past and I strain ahead for what is still to come; I am racing for the finish, for the prize to which God calls us upwards to receive in Christ Jesus.

Gospel Jn 8:1-11

A reading from the holy Gospel according to John *Let the person without sin be the first to throw a stone.* Jesus went to the Mount of Olives. At daybreak he appeared in the Temple again; and as all the people came to him, he sat down and began to teach them.

The scribes and Pharisees brought a woman along who had been caught committing adultery; and making her stand there in full view of everybody, they said to Jesus, 'Master, this woman was caught in the very act of committing adultery, and Moses has ordered us in the Law to condemn women like this to death by stoning. What have you to say?' They asked him this as a test, looking for something to use against him. But Jesus bent down and started writing on the ground with his finger. As they persisted with their question, he looked up and said, 'If there is one of you who has not sinned, let him be the first to throw a stone at her.' Then he bent down and wrote on the ground again. When they heard this they went away one by one, beginning with the eldest, until Jesus was left alone with the woman, who remained standing there. He looked up and said, 'Woman, where are they? Has no one condemned you?' 'No one, sir,' she replied. 'Neither do I condemn you,' said Jesus 'go away, and don't sin any more.'

Communion Antiphon

Jn 8:10-11

Has no one condemned you, woman? No one, Lord. Neither shall I condemn you. From now on, sin no more.

Holy Land Collection – Good Friday April 15th, 2022

The annual collection for the support of the Church in the Holy Land will take place on Good Friday, April 15th. This collection promotes the missionary work of the Church in the Holy Land by providing welfare assistance to local Christians in areas such as health, education, employment and housing. Parishes, schools, orphanages and medical centres throughout the Holy Land also rely on assistance from this collection. It is also used to maintain over 70 churches and shrines associated with the life of Jesus. Last year due to the ongoing global pandemic, it was again a difficult time for the Church and people of the Holy Land with much reduced income due to fewer pilgrims and lower church attendance around the world. In Australia, we were more fortunate and Australian Catholics donated \$1,126,098 (compared to \$406,023 in 2020 and \$1.3 million in 2019). This year, the Holy Land will continue facing an income shortfall due to the ongoing effects of the pandemic and so we again ask Catholics around the world to be as generous as possible. Please remember the Christians of the Holy Land on Good Friday and please keep them in your prayers. Thank you.

Dear Friends,

The liturgy today continues the theme of rejoicing that was so prevalent in last week's Gospel of the forgiving father in **Luke 15:11-32**, as we witness the forgiveness given to a sinner. Again we are asked to rejoice in the never ending and deep mercy, compassion and forgiveness of our God towards our sins no matter what we have done.

The story of the woman caught in adultery which makes up our Gospel today [John 8:1-11] is replete with symbolism and meaning. How did the scribes and Pharisees come to find out about this woman? Were they in search of her? Were they in search of someone to use in order to lay a trap for Jesus? What did they do with the woman's male accomplice? In fact, where is her accomplice and why was he not brought before Jesus for judgement? All we know is that their intentions were not pure. We know that they would go to any lengths in order to allow Jesus to compromise himself and his teaching and thereby have material to use against him as a way of getting rid of him.

It is ironic that they refer to Jesus as Teacher and then proceed to inform Jesus of what the Law requires in this case: death by stoning. But Jesus catches them out in their ploy. Again the irony is not lost when he makes the bold statement: 'Let him who is without sin, cast the first stone' [V. 7]. Jesus, the sinless one is the only person present who has any right to cast a verdict on this woman, and yet he remains there not as judge but as a means for her to begin again! It is interesting that her accusers leave beginning with the eldest — a suggestion that perhaps in being the eldest he has had a greater opportunity for sin.

It is symbolic that it is only when all her accusers leave the scene that Jesus actually addresses the woman. He has not taken her directly into consideration up till now. He did not ask her if the charge was indeed true or fabricated. He did not even ask her name. Once alone with her, he looks up at her and asks her to identify her accusers. She realises then that they have gone. Jesus, the only one who could truly accuse her sends her away renewed. This encounter has become for her a means of new life rather than death.

This story echoes the statement that John makes earlier in his Gospel in the encounter between Jesus and the Pharisee, Nicodemus [John 3:1-21] which ends with Jesus' statement: 'For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, that whoever believes in him should not perish but have eternal life. For God sent his only Son not to condemn the world, but that the world might be saved through him' [3:16-17]. The woman in today's Gospel certainly experienced and believed in the salvation offered by the Son of Man. We too are to be bearers of that same Good News, as we attempt to relate to those around us, not as judges, but as agents of God's mercy and compassion. And surely that is a good reason to rejoice.



Shaniella 23, grew up in a remote village in the Solomon Islands in a province which has limited educational and job opportunities – and one of the country's highest poverty rates.
