1st Reading

Acts 13:14, 43-52

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles

We are now turning to the gentiles.

Paul and Barnabas carried on from Perga till they reached Antioch in Pisidia. Here they went to synagogue on the sabbath and took their seats.

When the meeting broke up, many Jews and devout converts joined Paul and Barnabas, and in their talks with them Paul and Barnabas urged them to remain faithful to the grace God had given them.

The next sabbath almost the whole town assembled to hear the word of God. When they saw the crowds, the Jews, prompted by jealousy, used blasphemies and contradicted everything Paul said. Then Paul and Barnabas spoke out boldly, 'We had to proclaim the word of God to you first, but since you have rejected it, since you do not think yourselves worthy of eternal life, we must turn to the pagans. For this is what the Lord commanded us to do when he said:

I have made you a light for the nations, so that my salvation may reach the ends of the earth'.

It made the pagans very happy to hear this and they thanked the Lord for his message; all who were destined for eternal life became believers. Thus the word of the Lord spread through the whole countryside.

But the Jews worked upon some of the devout women of the upper classes and the leading men of the city and persuaded them to turn against Paul and Barnabas and expel them from their territory. So they shook the dust from their feet in defiance and went off to Iconium; but the disciples were filled with joy and the Holy Spirit.

A reading from the book of the Apocalypse The Lamb who is at the throne will be their shepherd and will lead them to springs of living water.

I, John, saw a huge number, impossible to count, of people from every nation, race, tribe and language; they were standing in front of the throne and in front of the Lamb, dressed in white robes and holding palms in their hands. One of the elders said to me, 'These are the people who have been through the great persecution, and because they have washed their robes white again in the blood of the Lamb, they now stand in front of God's throne and serve him day and night in his sanctuary; and the One who sits on the throne will spread his tent over them.

They will never hunger or thirst again; neither the sun nor scorching wind will ever plague them, because the Lamb who is at the throne will be their shepherd and will lead them to springs of living water; and God will wipe away all tears from their eyes'.

Dear Friends,

During the first three weeks of Easter we have seen that the Gospels centred on the apparitions of the Risen Jesus among his doubting and fearful disciples. Easter Sunday showed us how the disciples failed to believe the testimony of the women who experienced the empty tomb, with news of angelic messengers announcing that Jesus had been raised from the dead [John 20:1-9]. The Second Sunday of Easter told the story of Thomas, who refused to believe unless he was able to see and touch the wounds of Jesus [John 20:19-31]. Last Sunday we heard of the disconsolate disciples having gone back to their original and familiar profession of fishing at the Lake of Tiberias. After a fruitless night, they fail to recognise Jesus who is standing on the shore welcoming them with breakfast [John 21:1-19]. The familiar and common thread in all of these Gospel scenes is the failure of the disciples to recognise Jesus and the re-establishment of the disciples' relationships with the Risen Christ. Jesus returns to them and only rebukes them for their lack of faith and the length of time it took them to come to faith! He does not rebuke them for their denial and abandonment of him on the night of his arrest and trial. Surprisingly he greets them as friends and offers them words of peace. Their relationship with Jesus is restored to what it was before, but with the added power of the presence of the Risen Lord.

These first three Sundays of Easter also invite us to consider the elements that make up not only Resurrection Faith but also the foundations of the Christian community. Some of these elements are:

That doubt and fear can at times be part of our spiritual growth;

Growth in faith is a gradual process and that faith does not always provide us with all the answers to life's questions and issues:

The Risen Jesus offers us forgiveness, peace and joy;

Our apostolic mission comes from Jesus and is nourished through our acceptance of the Holy Spirit;

Need to continually listen to and heed the voice of Jesus;

Jesus sustains us through his word and sacraments

Our love of Jesus is the basis of our lives that leads us to respond in action to the needs of others;

Ultimately we need to surrender our wills and lives to God.

The next four Sunday Gospels will build upon these elements as seen in the restored relationship that the disciples now have with Jesus. This week Jesus presents himself as the Good Shepherd [John 10:27-30]. As the Good Shepherd, a benevolent image of Jesus in Christian spirituality, he states that certain traits occur in his relationship with his flock. They listen to his voice; know and follow him only; they are offered eternal life; they will never be lost and no -one will steal them from his presence, since they were a gift from the Father and Jesus and the Father are one. Jesus presents himself as the Good Shepherd as means then of challenging his disciples to also live their ministry, apostolate and indeed their whole lives in imitation of Jesus, the Good Shepherd. This comes as a natural progression from last week's Gospel when Jesus, in restoring Peter's relationship with him, asked him to three times declare his love for him, challenged him to tend and love his lambs and sheep. The invitation of Jesus for us to follow him by imitating the Good Shepherd is the very foundation of our pastoral care and work. It affects every aspect of our Parish community. Pastors must truly live in the example of Jesus the Good Shepherd, allowing their voice to resonate with the words of Jesus. Parishioners need to be aware of the needs of those in their community who are most in need. The Parish as a community needs to reach out in a hospitable and welcoming manner, receiving and challenging all people. May we pray for each other that we may give and receive after the model of Jesus the Good Shepherd.
