Entrance Antiphon

O sing a new song to the Lord, for he has worked wonders; in the sight of the nations he has shown his deliverance, alleluia.

1st Reading

Acts 14:21-27

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles

They assembled the church and gave an account of all that God had done with them.

Paul and Barnabas went back through Lystra and Iconium to Antioch. They put fresh heart into the disciples, encouraging them to persevere in the faith. 'We all have to experience many hardships' they said 'before we enter the kingdom of God.' In each of these churches they appointed elders, and with prayer and fasting they commended them to the Lord in whom they had come to believe.

They passed through Pisidia and reached Pamphylia. Then after proclaiming the word at Perga they went down to Attalia and from there sailed for Antioch, where they had originally been commended to the grace of God for the work they had now completed.

On their arrival they assembled the church and gave an account of all that God had done with them, and how he had opened the door of faith to the pagans.

Then I heard a loud voice call from the throne, 'You see this city? Here God lives among men. He will make his home among them; they shall be his people, and he will be their God; his name is God-with-them. He will wipe away all tears from their eyes; there will be no more death, and no more mourning or sadness. The world of the past has gone.'

Then the One sitting on the throne spoke: 'Now I am making the whole of creation new.'

Dear Friends,

This week's Gospel [John 13:31-35] provides us with the second element of what constitutes a follower of Christ. Last week in the Gospel of the Good Shepherd [John 10:27-30] we saw that a good, intimate, loving and responsive relationship with Jesus is needed in order for us to be able to hear his voice among the many voices that are bidding for our attention. This relationship is strengthened by our willingness to hear the Shepherd's voice and have the courage to follow in his ways.

Today's Gospel tells us that it is 'love' which identifies a person as a true follower of Jesus. Jesus tells his disciples: 'By this love that you have for one another, all will know you as my disciples' [John 13:35]. The love which Jesus is referring to is a special type of love. Love is a word which we use so often in our day to day communication that its true meaning may be both lost and confused. We use the word 'love' for most things from people to food. So often we say: 'I love pasta' or 'I love the Bulldogs'. Comments such as these can confuse our understanding of the quality of love that Jesus mentions.

So what type of love is Jesus calling us to? It is a love based on his experience and example: 'Love one another as I have loved you' [John 13: 34] are the words that Jesus uses in pronouncing this new commandment. Remember that this commandment comes directly after Jesus had washed the feet of the disciples, including Judas, who was looking for an opportunity to betray him to the authorities. It is an example that he asks them to not only keep in the forefront of their minds, but that they also should be prepared to imitate. [John 13:14-15].

The love that Jesus asks of his disciples is one that is **selfless** (the giving of all of ourselves for the good of the other); is sacrificial (a love which has no limits in what it gives and where it takes the relationship); exhibits understanding (a love which is present even though the receiver may not be perfect – it loves not what the person imagines the other to be, but what the person is here and now) and is forgiving (Jesus loved his disciples even though he knew of their limitations and the fact that they would betray, deny and abandon him at the time he most needed them. We hear of this in the post Resurrection appearances of Jesus to his disciples when his first words echo peace and not incrimination). It was because of this that he was able to bring peace and not admonition when he next met them on that first Easter morning. [John 20:19-29].


When we consider this type of love, it seems a little idealistic and even difficult – a love which is humanly speaking, unattainable, since all of us love with some conditions attached and we tend to love reserve our love more for those whose love for us is assured. Like all ideals, this love is a challenge to be prioritised in our Christian living. It is our **desire** to love in this manner that allows us to

to see a glimmer of this selfless, sacrificial, understanding and forgiving love. Without that ideal and the desire to pursue it, we allow ourselves to fall short of the mark and thus not be recognised as Jesus' followers. In his encyclical Deus Caritas Est (Dec 2005), the then, Pope Benedict XVI stated about love: 'the unbreakable bond between love of God and love of neighbour is emphasised. One is so closely connected to the other that to say we love God becomes a lie if we are closed to our neighbour or hate him altogether...love of neighbour is our path that leads to the encounter with God, and that closing our eyes to our neighbour also blinds us to God' [#16]. My love of neighbour and love of God becomes then two sides of the same coin – one cannot exist without the other. When I love for the sake of the other it becomes a realisation of this love that Jesus asks of us. The Jesuit spiritual author Gerard Hughes states that we can only claim to love God as much as the person we love the least. This statement challenges us to look at the level of our love, both of God and of others. One way of remaining faithful to this type of love is for us to continue to discern the voice and words of the Good Shepherd. Being challenged and formed by his words allows us to love by Jesus' command to love after his example. Never in the Gospel does Jesus tell us that this way of loving is easy, but he does make it a requirement for those who wish to call themselves his followers. May we never lose sight of this ideal.


