A reading from the book of Exodus

As long as Moses kept his arms raised, Israel had the advantage.

The Amalekites came and attacked Israel at Rephidim. Moses said to Joshua, 'Pick out men for yourself, and tomorrow morning march out to engage Amalek. I, meanwhile, will stand on the hilltop, the staff of God in my hand.' Joshua did as Moses told him and marched out to engage Amalek, while Moses and Aaron and Hur went up to the top of the hill. As long as Moses kept his arms raised, Israel had the advantage; when he let his arms fall, the advantage went to Amalek. But Moses arms grew heavy, so they took a stone and put it under him and on this he sat, Aaron and Hur supporting his arms, one on one side, one on the other; and his arms remained firm till sunset. With the edge of the sword Joshua cut down Amalek and his people.

Second Reading

2 Tm 3:14 – 4:2

A reading from the second letter of St Paul to Timothy *This is how the people of God become equipped and ready for every good work.*

You must keep to what you have been taught and know to be true; remember who your teachers were, and how, ever since you were a child, you have known the holy scriptures – from these you can learn the wisdom that leads to salvation through faith in Christ Jesus. All scripture is inspired by God and can profitably be used for teaching, for refuting error, for guiding people's lives and teaching them to be holy. This is how the man who is dedicated to God becomes fully equipped and ready for any good work.

Before God and before Christ Jesus who is to be judge of the living and the dead, I put this duty to you, in the name of his Appearing and of his kingdom: proclaim the message and, welcome or unwelcome, insist on it. Refute falsehood, correct error, call to obedience – but do all with patience and with the intention of teaching.

Lk 18:1-8

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke *God will see those who cry to him vindicated.*

Jesus told his disciples a parable about the need to pray continually and never lose heart. 'There was a judge in a certain town' he said 'who had neither fear of God nor respect for man. In the same town there was a widow who kept on coming to him and saying, "I want justice from you against my enemy!" For a long time he refused, but at last he said to himself, "Maybe I have neither fear of God nor respect for man, but since she keeps pestering me I must give this widow her just rights, or she will persist in coming and worry me to death."

And the Lord said, 'You notice what the unjust judge has to say? Now will not God see justice done to his chosen who cry to him day and night even when he delays to help them? I promise you, he will see justice done to them, and done speedily. But when the Son of Man comes, will he find any faith on earth?'

Spanish Group

Dear Friends,

Today's liturgy adds to the gift of FAITH the element of PERSEVERANCE - in preaching the Good News and in prayer. The parable that is presented to us in Luke's Gospel today [18:1-8] concerns two individuals: a judge or magistrate and a widow. This particular judge was one who would have been appointed by the Roman authorities to deal with certain communal claims and disputes. Such people were swayed more by the profit they could make from a claim than for the call to justice that it demanded. The larger the bribe, the more certain you were of receiving 'justice' from this judge. On the other hand, we have a widow, a person who symbolises all that is vulnerable and poor within Jewish society. A widow had no one to fight for her rights and so was at the disposal of those who had authority in society. She had no material or financial means to sway the judge. We are not told what the dispute was about. All we know is that it concerned the widow's enemy and that she had been appealing to the judge for some time.

The only tool at the disposal of the widow was *perseverance*: she just kept at him time and time again. The judge here described as one who 'fears neither God nor man' was being worn down by the widow's continual demand for justice. Luke tells us that through her perseverance the judge finally 'gave this widow her just rights'.

Usually in the Gospel parables the authority figure either stands for God or portrays what God is NOT like. In this parable, the judge is the opposite of God, as Jesus states: 'Now will not God see justice done to his chosen who cry to him night and day when he delays to help them' [v. 7]. In this statement Jesus is telling us that God will see to our good in God's own time. He is challenging us to see in our relationship with God something similar to that of a child and parent. Every parent will want to give their child what is good and beneficial to them, but they will not give them everything that they ask for every time they make a request. There will be times when parents will refuse to give their children what they ask for because of their good. This attitude calls to mind the words and mentality of the Lord's Prayer. We are to ask God for what we require each day, but we are also challenged to conclude our prayer with those very challenging words: 'your will be done'. God knows what is good for us and will grant that to us. His answer to our prayers may not be what we have asked for, but it is for our eventual good. Our faith, deepened and nourished through daily contact with the Scriptures allows us the faith to work with God's good will for us. The final words of today's Gospel: 'when the Son of Man comes, will he find

any faith on earth?' [v.8]. Do I have the courage and strength to persevere in my faith?

Please be advised that Fr. Bob will be attending a retreat at Tyburn Prior for a week from the Sunday 16th October.


Please keep him in your prayers.


Called to be Saints: a day retreat for young adults aged 16-30
