Second Sunday of Advent Year A

Entrance Antiphon

Cf. Is 30:19,30

O people of Sion, behold, the Lord will come to save the nations, and the Lord will make the glory of his voice heard in the joy of your heart.

1st Reading

Is 11:1-10

A reading from the prophet Isaiah

He judges the poor with justice.

A shoot springs from the stock of Jesse, a scion thrusts from his roots: on him the spirit of the Lord rests, a spirit of wisdom and insight, a spirit of counsel and power, a spirit of knowledge and of the fear of the Lord. (The fear of the Lord is his breath.) He does not judge by appearances, he gives no verdict on hearsay, but judges the wretched with integrity, and with equity gives a verdict for the poor of the land.

Integrity is the loincloth round his waist, faithfulness the belt about his hips.

His word is a rod that strikes the ruthless,

his sentences bring death to the wicked.

The wolf lives with the lamb, the panther lies down with the kid, calf and lion cub feed together with a little boy to lead them.

The cow and the bear make friends, their young lie down together.

The lion eats straw like the ox.

The infant plays over the cobra's hole; into the viper's lair the young child puts his hand.

They do no hurt, no harm, on all my holy mountain, for the country is filled with the knowledge of the Lord as the waters swell the sea.

That day, the root of Jesse shall stand as a signal to the peoples. It will be sought out by the nations and its home will be glorious.

Second Reading

Rom 15:4-9

A reading from the letter of St Paul to the Romans *Christ, the hope of all people.*

Everything that was written long ago in the scriptures was meant to teach us something about hope from the examples scripture gives of how people who did not give up were helped by God. And may he who helps us when we refuse to give up, help you all to be tolerant with each other, following the example of Christ Jesus, so that united in mind and voice you may give glory to the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ.

It can only be to God's glory, then, for you to treat each other in the same friendly way as Christ treated you. The reason Christ became the servant of circumcised Jews was not only so that God could faithfully carry out the promises made to the patriarchs, it was also to get the pagans to give glory to God for his mercy, as scripture says in one place: For this I shall praise you among the pagans and sing your name.

Gospel

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is close at hand.

In due course John the Baptist appeared; he preached in the wilderness of Judaea and this was his message: 'Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is close at hand.' This was the man the prophet Isaiah spoke of when he said:

A voice cries in the wilderness: Prepare a way for the Lord, make his paths straight.

This man John wore a garment made of camel-hair with a leather belt round his waist, and his food was locusts and wild honey. Then Jerusalem and all Judaea and the whole Jordan district made their way to him, and as they were baptised by him in the river Jordan they confessed their sins. But when he saw a number of Pharisees and Sadducees coming for baptism he said to them, 'Brood of vipers, who warned you to fly from the retribution that is coming? But if you are repentant, produce the appropriate fruit, and do not presume to tell yourselves, "We have Abraham for our father," because, I tell you, God can raise children for Abraham from these stones. Even now the axe is laid to the roots of the trees, so that any tree which fails to produce good fruit will be cut down and thrown on the fire. I baptise you in water for repentance, but the one who follows me is more powerful than I am, and I am not fit to carry his sandals; he will baptise you with the Holy Spirit and fire. His winnowing-fan is in his hand; he will clear his threshing-floor and gather his wheat into the barn; but the chaff he will burn in a fire that will never go out.'

Dear Friends,

Of the three Theological Virtues – Faith, Hope and Love, Hope can often be seen as the least important of the three virtues. Much is heard of and admired when it comes to the virtue of Love. St Paul speaks of it in profound and admirable ways in his First Letter to the Corinthians [13:1-13]. In fact he ends his ode to love by stating that 'these three remain: faith, hope and love, and the greatest of them is love'. Faith is a very prominent virtue in the Gospel, as Jesus fails to work miracles in places that do not exhibit faith.

Hope calls us to a different level and perhaps even to a different path. Hope looks towards a future that may be unknown and may even seem unattainable. But hope is founded in the present and reflected upon through the experiences of the past. Paul reminds us of this hope in the second reading as he states: 'everything that has been written long ago in the scriptures was meant to teach us something about hope from the examples scripture gives us of how people who did not give up were given help from God' [Romans 15:4]. This is the type of hope to which we are called, one that allows us to 'face our present: the present, even if it is arduous, can be lived and accepted if it leads towards a goal' [Emeritus Pope Benedict XVI: 'On Christian Hope'#1].

That goal to which Pope Benedict refers to is our redemption. The first reading today from the prophet **Isaiah [11:1-10]** looks towards the elements of that redemption – it speaks of a future that is filled with peace and harmony. It paints an incredible picture of how this harmony is viewed, as it mentions many different and opposite creatures living in close proximity: the wolf with the lamb; the panther with the kid; the calf with the lion; the cow with the bear. It all seems too unreal at first sight! But this becomes the element and basis for Advent hope, as it calls to mind a future and an existence that may at first sight be out of reach and almost impossible to attain, but one that with God's grace can be achieved.

It is at this stage that John the Baptist is introduced into the picture to give us an idea of how we can maintain and deepen this Advent hope. Apart from celebrating his birth and martyrdom, we only hear of John the Baptist during the Advent and Lenten seasons. He stands a figure, full of hope in witnessing to, prophesising and preparing for the coming of the Messiah. His means of preparing a way for the Lord begins with an admission of our sinfulness: 'repent, for the kingdom of heaven is close at hand' become John's first words to us in Matthew's Gospel. The quality and depth of our repentance is seen in the quality of our lives: 'but if you are repentant,' says John, 'then produce the appropriate fruit.' It is a simple process to name and acknowledge our sinfulness, our shortcomings. The hard task is then to initiate with God's grace a path - a process - that allows us to move away from those elements of sin that we have identified, and so to enable the appropriate fruit to be borne. This

appropriate fruit is the peace, justice and harmony that come from living in the light of God and his values. In today's first reading Isaiah tells us that the vision he proposes was able to be realised simply because 'the country is filled with the knowledge of the Lord' [11:9]. During this Advent period we are invited to deepen our knowledge of the Lord – not solely on an academic level but to know the Lord as a friend and Redeemer. On this our Christian hope is based.


Graduation Masses for OLR Primary
