Fourth Sunday of Lent —Year B

Entrance Antiphon

Cf Isaiah 66:10-11

Rejoice, Jerusalem, and all who love her. Be joyful, all who were in mourning; exult and be satisfied at her consoling breast.

First Reading 2 Chronicles 36:14-16. 19-23

A reading from the second book of Chronicles

The wrath and the mercy of the Lord are revealed in the exile and liberation of his people.

All the heads of the priesthood, and the people too, added infidelity to infidelity, copying all the shameful practices of the nations and defiling the Temple that the Lord had consecrated for himself in Jerusalem. The Lord, the God of their ancestors, tirelessly sent them messenger after messenger, since he wished to spare his people and his house. But they ridiculed the messengers of God, they despised his words, they laughed at his prophets, until at last the wrath of the Lord rose so high against his people that there was no further remedy.

Their enemies burned down the Temple of God, demolished the walls of Jerusalem, set fire to all its palaces, and destroyed everything of value in it. The survivors were deported by Nebuchadnezzar to Babylon; they were to serve him and his sons until the kingdom of Persia came to power. This is how the word of the Lord was fulfilled that he spoke through Jeremiah, 'Until this land has enjoyed its sabbath rest, until seventy years have gone by, it will keep sabbath throughout the days of its desolation.'

And in the first year of Cyrus king of Persia, to fulfil the word of the Lord that was spoken through Jeremiah, the Lord roused the spirit of Cyrus king of Persia to issue a proclamation and to have it publicly displayed throughout his kingdom: 'Thus speaks Cyrus king of Persia, "The Lord, the God of heaven, has given me all the kingdoms of the earth; he has ordered me to build him a Temple in Jerusalem, in Judah. Whoever there is among you of all his people, may his God be with him! Let him go up."

Responsorial Psalm

Ps 136, R. v.6

(R.) Let my tongue be silenced, if ever I forget you!

Second reading

1 Ephesians 2:4-10

A reading from the letter of St Paul to the Ephesians When we were dead through sins, he brought us to life.

God loved us with so much love that he was generous with his mercy: when we were dead through our sins, he brought us to life with Christ – it is through grace that you have been saved – and raised us up with him and gave us a place with him in heaven, in Christ Jesus.

This was to show for all ages to come, through his goodness towards us in Christ Jesus, how infinitely rich he is in grace. Because it is by grace that you have been saved, through faith; not by anything of your own, but by a gift from God; not by anything that you

have done, so that nobody can claim the credit. We are God's work of art, created in Christ Jesus to live the good life as from the beginning he had meant us to live it.

Gospel Acclamation

John 3:16

Glory and praise to you, Lord Jesus Christ! God loved the world so much, he gave us his only Son, that all who believe in him might have eternal life. Glory and praise to you, Lord Jesus Christ!

Gospel

John 3:14-21

A reading from the holy Gospel according to John God sent his Son into the world that we might be saved through him.

Jesus said to Nicodemus:

'The Son of Man must be lifted up as Moses lifted up the serpent in the desert, so that everyone who believes may have eternal life in him.

Yes, God loved the world so much that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not be lost.

but may have eternal life.
For God sent his Son into the world
not to condemn the world,
but so that through him the world might be saved.
No one who believes in him will be condemned;
but whoever refuses to believe is condemned al-

because he has refused to believe in the name of God's only Son.
On these grounds is sentence pronounced: that though the light has come into the world men have shown they prefer darkness to the light because their deeds were evil.
And indeed, everybody who does wrong hates the light and avoids it, for fear his actions should be exposed; but the man who lives by the truth comes out into the light, so that it may be plainly seen that what he does is done in God.'

Communion Antiphon

Cf Psalm 121: 3-4

Jerusalem is built as a city bonded as one together. It is there that the tribes go up, the tribes of the Lord, to praise the name of the Lord.

Dear Friends.

Have you ever been in a situation where you have given all your energy, time, love and commitment to another person: to have helped them in every way possible, only to have it all thrown back at you because the person either failed to respond to your generous attempts at assistance or they were so caught up in their ways that they could not perceive the good attempts coming from you?

If you have experienced anything like this then you can appreciate the content of the first reading today [2 Chronicles 36:14-16.19-23]. The author tells us of God's divine patience finally running out with regard to the Israelites. The Chronicler tells us that both priests and people added infidelity to infidelity. He states that they ridiculed, despised and laughed at the prophets sent by God to bring them back to the right path. God's patience runs out and the author tells us that this manifests itself in the Exile – the devastation and destruction of the Temple by the Babylonians eventuating in the Deportation – the Exile – of the people to Babylon.

The story, however, does not end in destruction and desolation. The author tells us that God raised Cyrus, king of Persia a type of saviour of the people. He defeats the Babylonians and declares that he will rebuild the Temple. He frees the Israelites to return to their homeland. It is an emphatic way of stating that God's intentions for his people are for life and salvation, not death and destruction.

This is reinforced in the second reading [Ephesians 2:4-10] and the Gospel [John 3:14-21]. Paul reminds us of the generosity of God's love and mercy, shown to us in the person of Jesus Christ. He stresses that this grace is a total and complete gift from God, freely given, even though our behaviour may not warrant it. The end result of this, Paul reminds us, is that 'we need to live the good life... as God had meant us to live' [v.10]. John continues this line of thought in the Gospel as he states: 'God loved the world so much that he gave his only Son'. God's gift of Jesus was to elicit from us faith in God's Son so that we may have eternal life. God's intention was not to condemn, but to bring about salvation. John recalls the incident in the Old Testament when Moses lifted up the fiery serpent in order for the people to look upon it and be saved [Numbers 21:4-9].

With today's liturgy we are at the midpoint of our Lenten journey. This Sunday is called 'Laetare Sunday' – the Sunday of joy. This is the reason why the celebrant wears rose coloured vestments today, rather than the more sombre purple or violet used on the other days of Lent. This joy, then is the central point of our readings today. It is a joy that emanates from the knowledge that God has shown us an immense love through Jesus Christ. God asks of us to simply belief in Jesus as the Son of God and to live according to that belief – to live in the light of his mercy and love. As we continue our Lenten journey, we can make the line from John's Gospel our mantra: 'God loved the world so much that he gave us his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not be lost but may have eternal life' [John 3:16]. In praying these words and believing in them, we have nothing to fear.





Memory is 26 years old and lives in rural Malawi. As the eldest child in a lowincome farming family, Memory had to take on many household chores and farming activities to support her parents. They struggled to pay for Memory's school fees and school supplies, and Memory often had to walk to school barefooted. With the support of Caritas Australia and its partner the Catholic Development Commission in Malawi (CADECOM), Memory was able to enrol at a technical college where she learnt technical skills in carpentry. She undertook a three-year carpentry course, with CADECOM supporting part of her tuition and boarding fees.



Memory became the first female carpenter from her village. Today, she works as a carpenter at one of Malawi's largest hydroelectric power stations. With the income from her job, she can provide financial support to her family and inspire other young women in her community so that they may have the opportunity to succeed in a maledominated industry.
