First Reading

Jeremiah 31:31-34

A reading from the prophet Jeremiah

The days are coming when I will make a new covenant with Israel and I will forgive their iniquity.

See, the days are coming - it is the Lord who speaks when I will make a new covenant with the House of Israel and the House of Judah, but not a covenant like the one I made with their ancestors on the day I took them by the hand to bring them out of the land of Egypt. They broke that covenant of mine, so I had to show them who was master. It is the Lord who speaks. No, this is the covenant I will make with the House of Israel when those days arrive – it is the Lord who speaks. Deep within them I will plant my Law, writing it on their hearts. Then I will be their God and they shall be my people. There will be no further need for neighbour to try to teach neighbour, or brother to say to brother, 'Learn to know the Lord!' No, they will all know me, the least no less than the greatest – it is the Lord who speaks – since I will forgive their iniquity and never call their sin to mind.

Gospel

A reading from the holy Gospel according to John

If a grain of wheat falls on the ground and dies, it yields a rich harvest.

Among those who went up to worship at the festival were some Greeks. These approached Philip, who came from Bethsaida in Galilee, and put this request to him, 'Sir, we should like to see Jesus.' Philip went to tell Andrew, and Andrew and Philip together went to tell Jesus. Jesus replied to them:

'Now the hour has come for the Son of Man to be glorified. I tell you most solemnly, unless a wheat grain falls on the ground and dies, it remains only a single grain; but if it dies, it yields a rich harvest. Anyone who loves his life loses it; anyone who hates his life in this world will keep it for the eternal life. If a man serves me, he must follow me, wherever I am, my servant will be there too. If anyone serves me, my Father will honour him. Now my soul is troubled. What shall I say: Father, save me from this hour? But it was for this very reason that I have come to this hour. Father, glorify your name!'

A voice came from heaven, 'I have glorified it, and I will glorify it again.'

People standing by, who heard this, said it was a clap of thunder; others said, 'It was an angel speaking to him.' Jesus answered, 'It was not for my sake that this voice came, but for yours.

'Now sentence is being passed on this world; now the prince of this world is to be overthrown. And when I am lifted up from the earth, I shall draw all men to myself.'

By these words he indicated the kind of death he would die.

Communion Antiphon

Dear Friends,

As we enter the second half of our Lenten period, our liturgy focuses on the death of Jesus. Last week we heard of the great gift that God has given us by giving us his only Son in order to save us and bring us redemption [John 3:16]. Next week, we celebrate Palm Sunday of the Passion of the Lord. It becomes a time for us to journey with Jesus from the time he was jubilantly welcomed into Jerusalem, to the intimacy of the Upper Room, to the loneliness and trial of the Garden of Gethsemane, to the courts of the Sanhedrin, Pilate and Herod, to the streets of Jerusalem as he carries his Cross to Calvary, to the desolation of Calvary, through to the Empty Tomb and its significance and meaning to the

Disciples.

In order to prepare us for this spiritual journey, the liturgy today gives us a glimpse into the meaning of Jesus' death. Jesus makes reference again to his being 'lifted up' as a means of drawing people to himself. Last week we heard this with reference to Moses lifting up the bronze serpent in the desert so that those bitten by the vipers could live by looking upon this lifted symbol. The image of Jesus being lifted on the Cross is not lost here: 'and when I am lifted up from the earth. I shall draw all men to myself' [John 12:33]. Jesus again strengths this idea of the significance of his death when he gives the analogy of the seed. Just a seed needs to die (that is break open its contents), only then can it give life by producing a crop. The analogy here is for the sake of his disciples, with regard to the decisions that they need to make in following in Jesus' ways. Those who love their life - that is those who make an absolute of what the world can offer (John's way of referring to all that is contrary to the ways of God) will lose their lives. The one who is prepared to let go – to die like the seed – will gain eternal life [John 12:25]. In serving Jesus, one finds true meaning in life.

Jesus makes reference to his 'hour' approaching. It is the hour of his glorification but also the hour that he dreads [John 12:20.27]. What is it that sustains Jesus in this hour of glory/desolation? It is his relationship with his God. It is the faith his has in his God - that although God has called him to travel along this path, God will sustain him, assist him and glorify him. The author to the Letter to the Hebrews makes note of this as he states: 'he submitted so humbly that his prayer was *heard*' [Hebrews 5:6]. Further he states that although Jesus was God's Son his obedience to God was strengthened through his suffering - the events which we will hear related in next Sunday's liturgy. Through Jesus' obedience to the demands of God which led to the Cross, he became for us a source of eternal salvation [Hebrews 5:9].

Our response to all this is to ask ourselves how prepared are we to follow God's will for us, even though we may not appreciate or understand what is happening to us? This calls for a spiritual obedience to God's will, after the example of Jesus. These next two Sundays draw us ever more closely to the mystery of Jesus' passion, death and Resurrection. These days challenge us to see what our response will be – what our level of trust, fidelity and obedience to God's will look like in our lives. May we truly and prayerfully enter into these most intimate and challenging of days.

Question: A minister on the altar will be vested in a long white alb. What is its meaning, and where did it come from?

Answer: The alb is the vestment that can be worn by members of the laity and clergy alike. It means 'white', simply referring to the colour of the vestment.

The practice grew out of the early church in which a baptised person would be clothed in a long, flowing, white garment. The practice was that the Sunday Eucharist (or '*synaxis*') you wore what you were baptised in because you were reliving or reinforcing the grace conferred at baptism.

The alb usually goes over a cassock for bishops, priest, and deacons, but under the cincture (the rope or ribbon-like vestment worn around the waist) in addition to the stole, chasuble or dalmatic. Since baptism is the first sacrament received, it is fitting that it is the first vestment put on by the sacred ministers.

An alb may be decorated by a lace, or an apparel, but regardless it must always be white, and should be distinguishable from other kinds of vestments as they denote and symbolise other aspects of Catholic liturgy.

Dear Friends, firstly a heartfelt thanks for your prayerful support during the time of my illness. Such prayer has resulted in the reduction of size of the tumour in my bowel, to the point that it was no longer detected by the last scan. Notwithstanding this progress, I have been scheduled for surgery on March 28th in order to remove the tumours on my liver and to attach a colostomy bag in order to relieve the ulcers in my rectum. I should be in hospital for about a week and then recovering at my family's home at Hazelbrook. I see the oncologist on April 18th to discuss the way forward. These are testing times, but the prayerful support of friends allows for a greater acceptance of God's will. I also wish to extend my thanks to Frs Tibe, Andrew and Ben and Deacon Joseph for their willingness to step in and ensure that all runs well in our parish. May we continue to encourage each other in the living out of our faith.
