us by allowing us to be God's children. The liturgy challenged us to recognise the identity we have in following Jesus, the Good Shepherd.

This week we are challenged to consider the need in our life for love: to love and be loved. The first reading [Acts 9:26-31] describes that very uneasy time in the life of the early Church when Saul came to Jerusalem. Here the community found themselves coming face to face with one of the greatest persecutors of the nascent Church. Perhaps a few of them knew of family or friends who had suffered persecution, imprisonment or even death at the hands of Saul. No wonder Luke tells us that the disciples were 'all afraid of him: they could not believe that he was really a disciple'. What happens here? Barnabas, who was to become Paul's missionary companion, 'took charge of him (Saul), introduced him to the apostles, and explained how the Lord had appeared to Saul'. In other words, Barnabas went beyond judging Saul and loved him in a truly practical manner. This is love in action. Barnabas decided to go beyond all expectations and take care of Saul and slowly allow the disciples to accept him and his conversion. Saul had become so accepted by the disciples that when he was in danger of being killed by the Hellenists because of his preaching they took him safely to Tarsus.

This is the type of love that John speaks about in the second reading [1 John 3:18-254], when he states that our love for each other has to be deeper than mere words and sentiments but be seen and recognised in our actions. John goes on to say that this is the type of life that God wishes us to live: a life that is steeped in his commandments. John recalls that God's commandments can be brought down to two: our belief in the name of Jesus, God's Son and that we love one another. He is adamant in saying that whoever keeps these commandments lives in God and God lives in them.

The Gospel [John 15:1-8] gives us an idea of how we can be strengthened to live out this life of faith and love. By using the image of the vine and branches, John has Jesus state that those branches that are attached to him will bear much fruit: 'whoever remains in me with me in him bears fruit in plenty'. This 'fruit' is seen in our life of faith and love for one another. One of the ways in which we remain in Jesus, and he remains in us, is that we love in our deeds, and not merely talk about loving. St Francis de Sales (1567-1622) can offer us some advice on how we can do this each day. He encourages us to begin our day by being conscious of God's presence and love. Francis' prayer would be: 'My God, I know that you are here with me. You are loving me today. Help me to be conscious you are with me in everything I do and and say today.' As we then begin each new activity during the course of the day, Francis would encourage us to be conscious again of God's presence and to ask for the help of

of God's grace so that we may undertake that activity in a way pleasing to God. Many of us may have grown up with this notion as we prayed the morning offering at the beginning of each day. In order for us to love as Jesus has loved, then we need to be focused on his person in our lives. In this way we can remember the fact that we are the branches of Jesus, the Vine, as we go about our daily tasks and living.



# Liturgy Corner With Fr. Ben



Question: We have two distinct parts of the Mass; the Liturgy of the Word, and the Liturgy of the Eucharist. Why do they fall in this order?

Answer: Anything liturgical must reflect the action of Christ, the Priest. We model what he has set out for us, and what he appoints his Apostles to do. Tradition and custom play a somewhat larger role, but

In many places in Scripture, Christ teaches (by word and by example), and then will eat. The most notable examples of this are the Last Supper, or the Road to Emmaus. A doctrine is imparted by word and example, there is an explanation, followed by a meal of some kind.

Mass, of course, is a sacred banquet; Christ's sacrifice of Calvary re-presented in an unbloodied fashion and not just a meal. But in Christ's example we see how there is a distinct ordering of how to worship. On another level, it is there not only for worship but for catechising: we need to have things explained before we go and do them.

From this, the early Apostolic tradition as we see in Acts and in Paul's letter to the Corinthians that this pattern of Word-Sacrament is continued in the early Christian communities, and then passed on to the spreading of the Faith. St. Justin Martyr, writing in 150 AD records how this is the basic structure of Christian worship, along with St. Hippolytus and other patristics authors.
